## Biology

Please note this is subject admissions feedback from the 2024 selec on round - there will be changes each year, and these pages are only retained to provide a general indica on of process.

The Biology admissions tutors would like to thank all applicants for the me and care they put into their applica ons. We are also grateful to referees for proving their suppor ng statements and for the encouragement and support they give to applicants.

In Biology, 770 (731 in 2023) candidates applied to Oxford. 349 (334 in 2023) were shortlisted for interview, and ul mately 149 (130 in 2023) offers were made (including 3 deferred offers for 2026 course entry), meaning that 19% of Biology applicants received an offer.

At Keble, 18 out of the 37 first choice applicants were interviewed; each shortlisted applicant for Keble was interviewed here and by one other pre-arranged college. Six offers were made for 2025. We took account of the full range of informa on available to us at shortlis ng, including informa on about school performance and on any specific factors affec ng achievement. Students were selected for interview from their UCAS forms on the basis of examina on scores (achieved and predicted), referee's report, and personal statement – showing both an interest in and an academic poten al for Biology. In their assessment of individual applica ons, the tutors took account of contextual data concerning rela ve individual and school performance as well as some background characteris cs related to place of residence. Regarding the interviewing process at Keble, no wri en tests were set and interviews were approximately 25 minutes in length. During the interview, candidates were partly assessed on their ability to analyse and comment on biological data or images that were presented to them. Very li le of the interview was concerned with ques ons that just required factual recall. We were par cularly interested in assessing whether the candidates were genuinely enthusias c about biology (this is a selec on criterion for Biology) and here it was helpful to ask them to discuss recent reading, project work or other work of a biological nature carried out outside of school.
