



## 2020 Admissions Round Feedback

### History and Joint Schools

**Please note this is subject admissions feedback from the 2020 selection round - there will be changes each year, and these pages are only retained to provide a general indication of process.**

This year Keble received 39 applications in History and Joint Schools (23 for History, 9 for History and Politics, 2 for History and Modern Languages and 5 for Ancient and Modern History). In the event we interviewed 31 following reallocations between colleges. We also interviewed 9 other candidates who had initially applied to other colleges at the mid-interview stage. We made a total of 12 offers: 8 in History; 2 in History and Politics; and 2 in Ancient and Modern History. Two of our offers were made to imports from other colleges. One offer was made to an overseas candidate; of the other offers six (two of them Opportunity Oxford) were given to state school candidates. All offers were for admission in 2021.

All aspects of a candidate's application were carefully reviewed, including their contextualised GCSE score (where available) and other qualifications, before any decision was to call them to interview. Performance on the HAT and contextualised GCSE scores are particularly significant in deciding whether to summon a candidate for interview. Marking of the HAT is fully anonymised and all scripts are double-blind marked by members of the History Faculty. Because of the pandemic interview arrangements varied significantly from previous years. All interviews took place on Microsoft Teams and lasted 30 minutes (20 minutes in the case of second round interviews). The interview was used to discuss historical topics previously studied, and matters arising from the personal statement. No serious technical issues were encountered in the interview process.

Our final decisions were based on very careful consideration of all aspects of each candidate's application: achieved and predicted examination results, UCAS reference and personal statement, submitted written work, performance in the HAT and performance in interview. In all aspects of the application procedure we are looking for evidence of strong analytical ability, clarity of expression, historical imagination and enthusiasm for the subject.

We were very impressed with the quality of our candidates. Most had excellent achieved and predicted results; the best were able to discuss their work in a fluent and analytical way, and to apply ideas they had encountered for the first time to periods and areas they had studied at school. We found UCAS personal statements that gave us a sense of the candidates' broader reading and intellectual interests to be particularly helpful. The vast majority of candidates interviewed were very able indeed. However, this is, of course, a very competitive process and the college has to prefer those candidates who perform best in comparison with one another across the range of criteria specified above.

## 5. Procedure for Shortlisting

Candidates are shortlisted if their combined HAT/contextualised GCSE score (or HAT score alone, if no cGCSEs are available) is above the cut-off point of the cohort as a whole. The cut-off point will be determined by the Organising Secretary at a level to ensure that the University's preferred interview to place ratio (3-1) is not exceeded. This year, owing to the impact of the Covid pandemic on interview arrangements and capacity, the cut-off was raised with the aim of achieving an interview to place ratio of around 2.5-1. Colleges are also able to shortlist candidates whose score is below the cut-off level if they consider there are strong grounds for retaining particular candidates on the basis of school performance data and/or other relevant information from the UCAS forms (eg. illness or difficult family circumstances).

In the case of HPOL, AMH, HML, and HECO, joint school candidates will also be recommended for shortlisting if they are above the cut-off point on the cGCSE/HAT score. In the case of HENG, English written work will also be included in the shortlisting algorithm (according to the formula of 40% HAT, 30% English written work, and 30% contextualized GCSE). In the case of HECO, the TSA score will also be included in the shortlisting algorithm (according to the formula one third HAT, one third TSA, one third contextualized GCSE). Joint-School candidates may also become candidates for English (HENG) or Modern Languages (HML), in each case with the agreement of the tutors from the other side of the school.

College tutors may also make a case to deselect other candidates whose scores are above the HAT/GCSE threshold, on specific grounds (for example they are not predicted grades which meet our conditional offer).

## 6. Weighting of Test/GCSE scores

Candidates are given scores and ranks at three different stages in the application process: at the shortlisting stage, immediately before the interviews, and after the interviews at the first college. The weightings of the different components used to score the applicants at each stage are outlined below:

### History and Modern Languages

HML candidates are considered at each stage of the process through consultation between College tutors from both History and ML. All information about these candidates, for both subjects, - GCSE score, pre-interview test scores (HAT and MLAT), written work scores, interview times and scores - is entered into the Modern Languages Admissions Database (MLAD) by the

College's ML Primary User (who is one of the ML tutors). This results in each candidate carrying a 'guide score' (school written work scores are not included in this calculation). Final admissions decisions may be informed by this score, but it is not used mechanistically as a ranking tool.

### 7. How information from different sources is factored together in reaching decisions at each stage of the admissions procedure.

Although the scores, individually and combined, provide a helpful framework for assessing candidates, tutors also take into account the individual circumstances and potential abilities of each candidate.

## SECTION B – Statistical Information

### 1. GCSEs and the Contextualised GCSE score

#### Contextualised GCSE 9/8/A\* score (cGCSE)

The cGCSE score provides information about how well an applicant has performed at GCSE compared to other applicants to Oxford, given the performance of the school at which they took their GCSEs. It can be useful for identifying applicants from low performing schools who have achieved fewer top grades than other applicants, but more than would be expected for an average applicant from that school, and vice versa. From 2018 entry, 'top grades' now includes 9 and 8 in reformed GCSE qualifications.

The cGCSE score is calculated by comparing the achieved number of 9/8/A\* at GCSE to the expected number. Scores are expressed as standard deviation and will typically be in the range **-3** to **+3**, expressed to 4 decimal places:

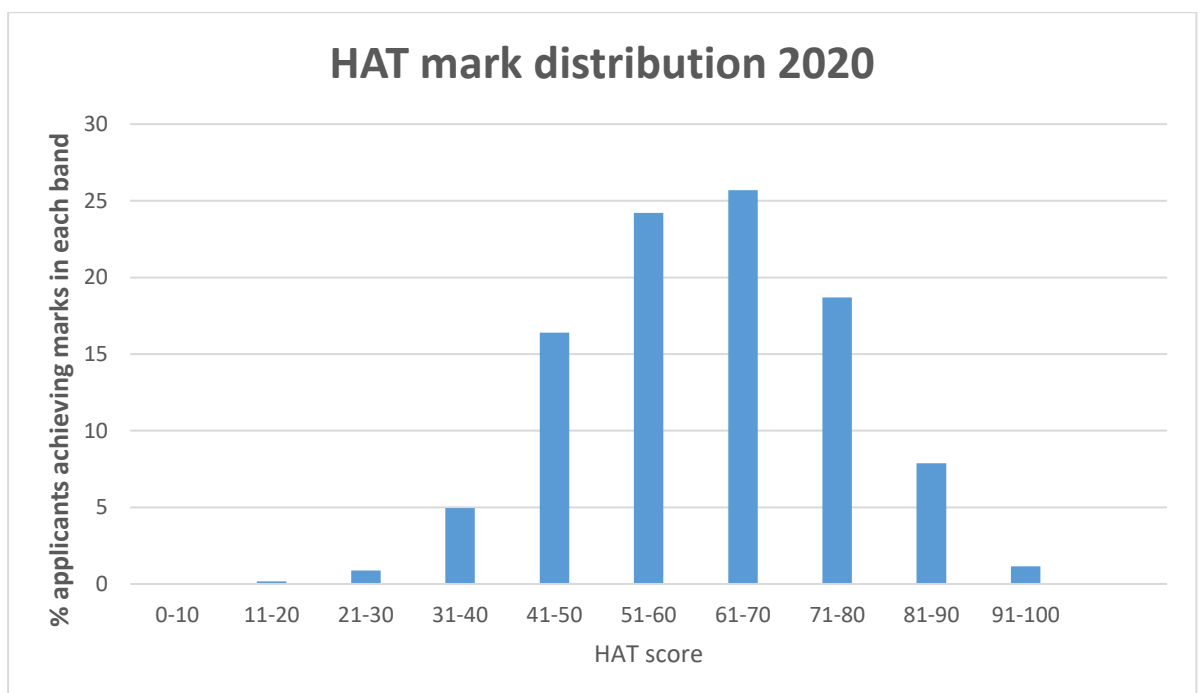
- Positive: a score **above 0**. This indicates that they have performed better than expected.
- Neutral: a score **of 0**. This indicates that they have performed at the level expected.
- Negative: a score **below 0**. This indicates that they have performed below expectations.

### 5. Applicants with non-GCSE and non-A Level qualifications

There were **414** applicants for History and its associated Joint Schools with pre-16 qualifications other than GCSEs. Of these applicants, **172** were shortlisted and **48** were placed (a 11.6% success rate).

There were **623** applicants taking post-16 qualifications other than A Levels (this includes **125** candidates taking a mixture of A-levels and other qualifications). Of these applicants, **306** were shortlisted and **95** were placed (a 15.3% success rate).

### 6. Opportunity Oxford

Opportunity Oxford offers are made to candidates who meet particular criteria in relation to socio-economic and educational disadvantage. Out of the total offers made, 344 were standard offers - ie. three As at A Level or an equivalent - while 26 were Opportunity Oxford offers - ie. three As at A level or an equivalent plus attendance on a short specially designed programme of skills acquisition and learning prior to starting their degree.
