2022 Admissions Round Feedback

History and joint schools

Please note this is subject admissions feedback from the 2022 selection round - there will be changes each year, and these pages are only retained to provide a general indication of process.

The History admissions tutors would like to thank all applicants for the time and care they put into their applications. We are also grateful to referees for proving their supporting statements and for the encouragement and support they give to applicants.

Keble admits students for History, Ancient and Modern History, History and Politics, and History and Modern Languages (French, Italian, and Spanish only). A summary of the number of applications, shortlisted applicants and offers in History and joint schools is provided by the Faculty of History and is available on this website. This year there were 1788 applications (slightly fewer than last year) for all courses involving History; 1046 candidates were shortlisted for interview; and 378 offers were made.

In Keble, there were 43 first-choice applicants (two for Ancient and Modern History, 15 for History & Politics, two for History & Modern Languages, and 24 for History). A total of 30 were shortlisted for interview, including seven who were reassigned to Keble from other colleges. One Keble applicant was allocated to another college for interviews). A further 11 candidates were interviewed in the second round. 11 offers were made for 2023 entry.

The criteria for shortlisting differ according to the course, and they are described in full in the Faculty's summary report mentioned above.

All aspects of a candidate's application were carefully reviewed, including their GCSE results and other qualifications, before any decision was to call them to interview. Performance on the HAT and GCSE scores are particularly significant in deciding whether to summon a candidate for interview. Marking of the HAT is fully anonymised and all scripts are doubleblind marked by members of the History Faculty. Interviews took place on Microsoft Teams and lasted 30 minutes (20 minutes in the case of second round interviews). Applicants for History were interviewed by a team of three History tutors. Applicants for joint schools, including Ancient and Modern History, were also interviewed by tutors in the appropriate subject.

Interviews for History began with the tutors asking candidates to summarise a piece of historical writing sent to them online ninety minutes before the start of the interview. The passage was deliberately challenging, but the kind of text undergraduates would encounter regularly in the course of their degree study. Using a passage in this way enables comparisons across the whole cohort of candidates. The best candidates showed high order comprehension and analytical skills, and were able to apply the arguments and concepts

deployed in the passage to other contemporary or historical topics they knew about. Interviewees could also be asked questions arising from topics they have studied at school, their written work, or from their UCAS personal statement, but the bulk of the interview was taken up by discussion of the passage.

Our final decisions were based on very careful consideration of all aspects of each candidate's application: achieved and predicted examination results, UCAS reference and personal statement, submitted written work, performance in the HAT and performance in interview. In all aspects of the application procedure we are looking for evidence of strong analytical ability, clarity of expression, historical imagination and enthusiasm for the subject.

In their assessment of individual applications, the tutors took account of contextual data concerning relative individual and school performance as well as some background characteristics related to place of residence. This information is available only for applicants from within the UK. This year tutors were also aware of the potential and uneven impact of the Covid-19 pandemic on both learning and assessment.

There is a commitment across the colleges to ensure that the chances of being made an offer are not disproportionately affected by college choice. The History tutors therefore interviewed eleven applicants to other colleges and, in turn, some Keble applicants were also interviewed elsewhere.

Eleven offers were made at Keble this year. These comprised six for History and five for History and Politics. There were no offers for neither History & Modern Languages nor Ancient and Modern History this particular year. Two of these offers were made to applicants to other colleges.
