DIRECTOR'S WELCOME

Welcome to the 2026 Keble Early Music Festival!

A warm welcome to the 2026 Keble Early Music Festival – the 12th edition of Oxford's premier dedicated early music festival. 2026 marks the 150th anniversary of the construction of Keble Chapel, which provides a grand and ambient setting for so many of our festival events, not least our opening concert of English music performed by The Brabant Ensemble and friends, featuring two versions of Tallis's monumental and rarely heard, 40-voice motet Spem in alium – a work composed for Elizabeth I's 40th birthday. Stringed instruments are at the heart of this year's festival with a return visit from *Vivaldi* experts La Serinissima for an uplifting 'Crossing Borders' programme centred around that composer. Thursday evening provides a more intimate concert dedicated to Biber, given by Illyria Consort, led by star violinist **Bojan Čičić**. The festival also marks the 400th anniversary of the death of England's greatest lutenist-composer, John **Dowland** with a series of lute-dedicated events on the Friday, including a special talk given by the world's leading luthier Michael Lowe, followed by a recital celebrating Dowland performed by world-renowned lutenist Jakob Lindberg. Friday and Saturday evenings feature two of JS Bach's most celebrated works as we welcome back our patron, harpsichord virtuoso, Mahan Esfanahi for a performance of the composer's swansong contrapuntal collection, *The Art of Fugue*, then on Saturday evening, Keble Chapel Choir are joined by the Instruments of Time & Truth, and a host of star soloists, with Gwilym Bowen (evangelist) in a performance of the *St John Passion*.

As always, there is a strong educational motivation within the festival, expressed through our schools Baroque String Workshop and Bach event with Thames Valley Early Music Forum. Oxford University students take part in several free lunchtime events including Keble's graduate singers on Wednesday, The Bate Collective (directed by Jonathan Williams) on Thursday, and members of Ancient Music at Oxford on Saturday. We also invite a selection of Choral Scholars from around the university to expand The Brabant Ensemble's forces for Spem in alium on Tuesday evening.

I hope that there is something to satisfy every taste!

BACH'S 'THE ART OF FUGUE' Mahan Esfahani
