INTRODUCTION

Welcome to this issue of *The Record*. As we write this, Sir Jonathan Phillips has just demitted as Warden, having led us through twelve years in which the H B Allen Centre became reality and the College celebrated its sesquicentenary. We wish Jonathan and Amanda well in their retirement, secure in the knowledge that they have many interests to keep them occupied, and confident of their continuing friendship and involvement. The new Jonathan and Amanda Philips awards, for student contributions to the life of college, will celebrate that involvement in perpetuity. One immediate consequence of Sir Jonathan's departure is that this introduction is unusual in having been written by the Senior Tutor and the Sub-Warden.

There were a number of changes to the Fellowship this year, although perhaps fewer than in many recent years. After five years as Chaplain, and including three years as Welfare Fellow, Rev Nevsky Everett departed for a new position as Chaplain of the Anglican Church of the Resurrection, Bucharest. We hope that Nevsky and his family will enjoy their new life in Romania. We also said goodbye to Diana Leca, Robin Geffen Career Development Fellow in English. Diana joined Keble in 2017 and is moving to a Marie Curie Global Fellowship in English at the University of Cambridge, a post which will enable her to carry out research at the University of California, Los Angeles. Finally, Dr Akash Trivedi, who arrived at Keble in January 2021 as Research Fellow and Tutor in Engineering, has departed to pursue a career outside academia.

Six new Honorary Fellows were elected in the course of 2021–22, all alumni of the College. Zain Asher is an author and journalist at CNN International, an organization she joined in 2013. Andrew Balls is Chief Investment Officer for Global Fixed Income at PIMCO. Professor Quassim Casam is Professor of Philosophy at the University of Warwick, having previously held post at University College London and the University of Cambridge. Kannon Shanmugam is appellate advocate and managing partner at the Washington office of Paul, Weiss, Rifkind, Wharton and Garrison. Professor Sir David Spiegelhalter, having retired as the Winton Professor for the Public Understanding of Risk at the University of Cambridge, now heads the Winton Centre for Risk and Evidence Communication at the same university. William Pollard, retired Professor of English, was elected to an Honorary Fellowship in recognition of his support for teaching and learning.

Helen Byrne was elected to a Professorial Fellowship following her resignation as Associate Professor and Tutorial Fellow in Applied Mathematics. Dr Sherine El-Taraboulsi McCarthy, Director of the NatCen International at the National Centre for Social Research was a Visiting Fellow in Hilary and Trinity terms.

Finally, we welcome our new Warden, Sir Mike Jacobs, who took up office on 1st October 2022. Sir Mike is a world-renowned expert on infectious diseases whose work at the Royal Free Hospital has involved leading the UK response to Ebola, while he has recently been deeply involved in the response to Covid-19. Mike brings his family, and his Welsh Terrier, to the lodgings, and we extend a warm welcome to them too!

We hope you'll find new things and new developments of interest in this Record, and (as always) look forward to hearing news from all members of the lifelong Keble community.

THE COLLEGE YEAR

We have expanded the selection of reports in this year's Record to better reflect the wide range of activities making up the College year. We hope readers will enjoy reading the new format.

Senior Tutor Dr Ali Rogers

The Covid-19 pandemic cast a shadow over the College throughout the year, with lasting consequences even after the main public health measures were lifted and we returned to in-person teaching from March. In October total student numbers briefly topped the thousand mark, with many postgraduates extending the completion date of their courses to make up for time lost in laboratories and archives, or to ill-health. By early December, Keble's student body numbered 985 (460 undergraduates and 525 graduates, of whom 160 are part-time). That makes us currently the largest mixed college in the University.

The new undergraduates had of course experienced severe disruption to their teaching and assessments during their school years. We were conscious that many of them may not have had sufficient opportunity to develop the kind of learning skills they need to thrive at Oxford. In cooperation with our colleagues at the Oxford Study Skills Centre, we therefore appointed two trained lecturers in study skills. Their job will be to work with both year groups and individuals to enable students to build more confidence in their techniques and practices of learning; time-management seems to be the most commonly-reported problem. In making these appointments we were careful not to give the impression that our freshers were somehow deficient in the skills they need. An advantage of Oxford's course structure is that it does allow students the time to learn how to write essays or do problem sheets. We try to stress that no one is expected to be fully competent from day one and that we'll give them the support they need to succeed by the end of their course.

It was good to be able to re-open our doors and welcome back visitors from schools in our link region, and to run Open Days again. But, thanks to our Outreach Fellow, Dr Foteini Dimirouli and the student ambassadors from Keble at Large, we were still able to reach lots of prospective applicants through online Q&A, YouTube and related social media. An annual review of all our access work is on the [College website](#).

Even before the pandemic, the University was encouraging ways to diversify assessment and looking into the prospects for doing exams online and on computer, rather than writing by hand in Exam Schools. These initiatives have been speeded up in the past two years. Even with a return to in-person teaching, around a third of this year's exams were done online and in College or private residences. Some subjects, History for example, have take-home exams. Finalists are given questions in 8th week and expected to write three essays by the end of 9th week. In English and Modern Languages, finalists are given their exam papers in the morning and must submit by 5pm on the same day. In between, they are free to make use of their books, notes and any other resources they think they need. There are major logistical, technical, and administrative hurdles to overcome before doing exams on computers rather than paper is the norm, but it could happen by the end of the decade. One consequence of the proliferation of online exams sat in students' rooms is that, for practically all of Trinity, the College had to be a very quiet place. Needless to say, that didn't make everyone happy!

The slow return to something like normality was a challenge for staff and students. It's good to be able to report that, nonetheless, over 90% of finalists were awarded Firsts or Upper Seconds, though that figure was slightly down on the year before. One simple lesson learned during the pandemic was how important it is to praise people. To that end, and with the help of the JCR and MCR, the College has initiated a new annual awards scheme for students who have made a significant contribution to college life. We routinely reward academic, musical and sporting achievement in various ways, but we have not publicly celebrated the contributions made by those who for example, take on demanding JCR and MCR roles. The Jonathan and Amanda Phillips Awards, as they are now called, will now give us that opportunity.

Academic Director of The H B Allen Centre Dr Ian W Archer

The opening of The H B Allen Centre in October 2018 transformed the position of graduates in the Keble ecosystem. We are now able to house most graduates for at least one year of their programmes with significantly enhanced facilities, including two common rooms, a new cafe, a gym, and spacious terraces. It has also enabled us to expand and diversify the postgraduate population with a significant contribution to part time programmes, particularly the Executive MBA and the Masters in Major Project Management.

It was decided that we should make a real effort to foster a graduate community, not only through shared faculties, but also through academic and cultural activities to bring students of different disciplines together. We also want to build relationships with our partners on the site: Robotics, and Oxford Science Enterprises, both of which have stand-alone buildings adjacent to the site as well as sharing the basement area. Hence the role of Academic Director, which I have held since the Centre's inception.

This involves hosting a variety of events. Some of them are simply social, drinks parties and pizza evenings, but most have an academic component. We have run graduate symposia on artificial intelligence and pandemics, but most popular are the research showcases where half a dozen graduates from the full range of disciplines make five-minute presentations on their research. So, in the course of an evening one might hear presentations on topics as diverse as: the use of artificial intelligence in immigration control; pupillometry as a bio marker for Alzheimer's; climate risks to ports and their dependent supply chains; optical fibres in gas detection; genomic insights from the Sunda Clouded Leopards of Borneo; and creativity, community and music among forced migrants. Such it is to be at the cutting edge of Oxford research! These 'elevator pitches' are not only entertaining and informative, but are excellent training in communicating to wider audiences, including dare one say, job interview panels.

The role is not without challenges. For the first year of the Centre's operation, the building was only partially constructed, which generated a degree of tension with the residents, by and large amicably negotiated through the good offices of the MCR representatives. Then a few months after the official opening by the Duke of Cambridge in October 2019 the pandemic struck, and we were faced with lockdowns and significant numbers of our graduates unable to reach the UK and forced to study remotely. We did run a number of online events, including with Oxford Science Enterprises, and the online symposium on pandemics was opened to alumni which brought us some very prominent attendees. But the community was undoubtedly fractured, and its focus diverted. Attempts to run a symposium on the implications of race and colonialism for our research in response to the Black Lives Matter movement foundered for lack of interest.

The past year has seen a return to 'normality', albeit with a significant re-learning curve for all of us on how to make things happen. There has been an initial emphasis on social events, and MCR members are regularly hosted at High Table, but we have run a couple of research showcases, and cultural visits, including the Painted Room hidden above the Bet Fred betting shop in Cornmarket. It was part of a tavern in which Shakespeare likely stayed, and is open by appointment with the Oxford Preservation Trust. Rather to my surprise, the College History Tours proved very popular, and have been run multiple times.

Participation levels both by graduates and the fellows could be higher. There is of course bound to be an activist core, and I am very grateful to successive MCR Presidents (Javier Pardo Diaz, Annie Welden, Sam White, Sydney Yee, and Kevin Wang) and their committees. We have made significant progress, but more needs to be done.

The past year has undoubtedly brought forth many challenges, but I am immensely proud of how we, as Keble undergraduates, have come together to overcome them; from working with post-pandemic restrictions, online learning, and simply coping with the academic pressures.

We have seen a wonderful revival of our community, with a range of events and activities including something for everyone. Beginning Michaelmas with a busy Freshers' Week, we followed it with the re-opening of the college bar, BOPs, talent shows, music nights, and finished it off with Keble's victory in the BOGOF inter-college foodbank drive! Through Hilary, we hosted formal dinners, cups of tea with our welfare team and even more socials. We also saw the success of the Keble Arts Festival, with this year's theme of 'Wilder and Wilder'. This included an original exhibition featuring works from Keble students, local artists, as well as the winners of a local primary school art competition. Finally, Trinity brought the return of the very popular alpacas and, a particular highlight of the year, our summer garden party, with live music performed by students, Pimm's, and paella.

Outside the gates, our sports teams have succeeded in football, rugby, lacrosse, netball, tennis and even association croquet, with many excelling in inter-college tournaments. On the river we had six Keble boats, with the M1 finishing third overall.

We now look forward to an exciting year ahead, with a new JCR team, new ideas, and more events. Preparations are also now well under way for the return of the Keble Ball for the first time in four years.

MCR President

Whilst restrictions eased, challenges remained during a year of rebuilding community spirit in the Middle Common Room. While we started the year ‘coming out of the end of Covid’, restrictions had not completely vanished; with many of our members subject to travel quarantines, Zoom socials and isolation care packages were still in order. Once they had overcome travel quarantines, our incoming students were finally able to meet their College family, enjoy fantastic freshers’ week events and even a receive a handy Keble KeepCup courtesy of the Talbot Fund. At long last, MCR meetings, games nights and other socials could be moved back in person.

As Michaelmas Term progressed, we were treated to an MCR Bake Off, and a Halloween BOP. Focused on our environmental agenda, we aimed to reduce the MCR’s carbon footprint through considered catering and were hence treated to a showcase of free vegan meals from the hall. But, at the end of term, not long after our traditional Christmas Hall and just as we thought normality had returned, Covid-19 made a resurgence with the Omicron variant, once again plunging many of us into isolation. The dining hall was closed, and social events restricted to keep us safe. Fortunately, Keble’s strong welfare team took care of us, with the MCR welfare officers running brunches and our peer supporters looking out for us during the tough winter months and beyond.

Midway through Hilary Term, restrictions were lifted for the final time (fingers crossed) and formal hall returned in Trinity along with a new tradition—‘MCR Table’. This saw the dining hall packed with MCR members every Friday evening, with a special dessert hosted in the old common room. Exchanges also returned, with visits to and from Linacre, Corpus, Harris Manchester, St Antony’s, Worcester, Jesus College and even Selwyn College, Cambridge. A particularly enjoyable and successful exchange with Merton College ignited a special relationship between the colleges’ middle common rooms, leading to a croquet visit and summer party in Trinity.

Once Omicron cases subsided, we were finally able to fully re-integrate with both common members and the senior members of Keble. Whether through research showcase events, Wednesday High Tables, Dr Archer’s terrace social events or renowned Oxford History Tours, our community grew together once again. On the charitable front this year, we used our levy to make a significant contribution to the British Red Cross appeal to assist with the humanitarian crisis in Ukraine.

As the weather warmed up, the MCR’s punt has proved very popular, while the lawns were made good use of for croquet—we were fortunate enough to see an MCR team reach the third round of croquet Cuppers! The return of Summer Eights allowed Keble to return to celebrate together at the Boathouse. Topping off the year was our incredibly successful black tie-dinner. With a packed hall and well attended after-party that will no doubt go down in history, it was clear that our enormous community spirit had returned for good.

Looking back, we could not have had such a good year without the enormous contribution from every single member of the MCR committee. It was only through their hard work, creativity, and commitment that we were able to bring together all the corners of our community to enjoy an incredibly diverse range of social events which included craft mornings, painting and drawing classes, board game nights, sporting competitions, movies nights, Sunday pub lunches, Pride and diversity drinks, bowling, yoga, and quizzes.

Looking at the year ahead, the MCR is in a brilliant position, particularly after a hotly contested election in Trinity Term. I have no doubt that the common room will be in safe hands under the guidance of our new President, Kevin Wang, and his committee. I look forward to seeing our common room continue to grow in spirit and community in the year ahead!

Bursar

In this report last year, I noted that College income streams were beginning to improve in Michaelmas Term 21 following various Covid-19 impacts. The positive news is that the recovery continued during the year even though Omicron caused significant further disruption during the winter. The new challenge is that extremely high levels of inflation not only threaten our post Covid-19 recovery but expose the frailty of our modestly endowed financial operating model.

During 2021/22 student occupancy was high, in line with budget and was not impacted by Omicron so academic fees and rents were as expected. The students returned to normal social activities with enthusiasm and as a result College catering income recovered strongly despite Omicron related disruption during the first half of Hilary Term.

The conference business delivered just over 60% of pre-pandemic revenue during the year compared to the 50% budgeted and activity during the 2022 summer vacation returned

fully to previous levels. However, while we were successful in reclaiming market share, the profitability of the business was severely impacted by a combination of rapidly rising inflation and an extremely tight labour market that led to significant use of expensive agency staff and high recruitment costs.

Net annual cashflow for the College was £0.2m positive which was well short of pre-Covid-19 levels. The 2022/23 budget demonstrates the full year effect of high inflation with a net cashflow deficit of £0.3m, even after building in full recovery of the conference business. College energy costs in 2022/23 will be just under £1m and now account for 8% of total costs, having risen by 300% in two years. Longer term projections show the College cashflow position will only worsen in the years ahead as the domestic undergraduate tuition fee is expected to remain frozen.

We have sufficient headroom in our bank overdraft facility that this does not yet represent a financial crisis for Keble but alarm bells are sounding. As it stands we have no way of repaying the £4m 'Covid-19' bank loan due for repayment 2024–28 other than calling on our overdraft. The financial projections do not yet include the costs of any strategic investment whether for example to increase support for the academic mission of the College or to deliver a sustainability plan.

The immediate financial challenge for Keble is to improve our annual cashflow by £2m. This is the internal target for the College and represents 15% of unrestricted annual income so we will need to consider quite radical options for income generation and/or cost reduction.

Dependent as we are on an endowment operating model we can be pleased that despite uncertainty and volatility in the markets during the year our endowment increased slightly to just over £60m at 31 July 2022. Unfortunately, the stark reality is that if we were to look solely to the endowment to meet the £2m target it would need to double to £120m. Such is the scale of the financial challenge that we face.

Chaplain

This past year has been one of immense change in the chapel community. Nevsky's departure as Chaplain was expected and then delayed, so in many ways life continued as usual. We were in and out of Covid-19 protocols but by and large chapel functioned as we had pre-pandemic but we continued the live streaming of sung chapel services. This allowed many alumni to connect with the College in a way which had not been possible previously and which is valued by many.

It was wonderful to be able to mark Advent and Christmas with traditional carol services. We held our 15th Holocaust Memorial service in partnership with the Oxford Jewish community and marked the 70th anniversary of the Queen's Accession.

During Hilary Term Nevsky's departure was confirmed for the end of the term and it was agreed that I would step up from my role as Assistant Chaplain to be the Acting Chaplain until 1 September.

Trinity Term would be the final term for the Warden and for our Director of Music, Paul Brough, who had announced that he would retire at the end of the summer. Trinity was going to be busy with appointments! During the term our preachers included the Right Revd Dr Stephen Conway, Bishop of Ely and the Right Revd Dr John Inge, Bishop of Worcester, both alumni. The Very Revd Dr John O'Connor the Regent of Blackfriars and Dr Jenn Strawbridge, a former Chaplain.

We hosted joint services with the choirs of Oriel and Merton Colleges, sang from the chapel roof on Ascension Day morning and sang Evensong at St Peter's Southrop, where John Keble had been the curate.

We finished the year secure in the knowledge that a new Chaplain and a new Director of Music would be joining us in September 2022!

Parishes Update

The system of patronage in the Church of England is a strange animal! The College has 69 "livings" the length and breadth of the country, from the Isle of Wight to North Yorkshire, from Herefordshire to the Isle of Sheppey—covering 24 of the 42 English dioceses.

Our involvement with a parish peaks when there is a vacancy and the College is always active in the appointment of a new incumbent. There are currently five vacancies and an appointment was made to St Augustine's South Kensington which is linked with Holy

Trinity Brompton. The College also supports parishes where there is anxiety during pastoral reorganisation and has some funds to assist parishes in the Diocese of Birmingham.

Keble continues to have a high level of engagement with the parishes of which it is patron. It was still not possible to welcome parishes to corporate communion and dinner in Hilary Term but we look forward to inviting them back in 2023.

Librarian

'Silence in the library' took on a whole new meaning during the lockdowns of 2020–21, and so it was with great pleasure that Keble Library welcomed back the buzz of students at the start of the academic year 2021.

Working Library

Library inductions were delivered in person for the first time in two years, compulsory for every undergraduate and optional for postgraduates. An introduction to the Librarians, Oxford Library System and the rules was followed by a homegrown game titled *Library Heist* which focused on getting the students moving about the library space and understanding shelf numbers. More asynchronous induction materials were also made available on our webpage, including instructional videos and a second part to the game.

College Librarian, Fiona Wilson, announced that her maternity leave would be starting from the end of February 2022. Leona Stewart, who joined the College in July 2021 as Assistant Librarian, stepped in as Acting Librarian and in January 2022, Dominic Hewett joined as Assistant Librarian.

Throughout the year we have continuously assessed student needs and kept a close eye on the library's capacity, so we are very pleased that there are now 82 available study spaces, up from the 56 that were possible while social distancing measures were in place. We have been kept busy all through the year running an enquiry service for undergraduates, postgraduates, associate members and summer schools.

As well as the acquisition of many academic books, we have also put our minds to providing more resources on wellbeing, study skills, diversity and inclusion, and ran a *Book Valentine* scheme in February, in which students could sign up to receive a mystery book from these collections.

Library Fabric

After a survey of the library's stained-glass windows in July 2021, a plan was put in motion to have certain panes restored. With that, scaffolding was erected during the Easter vacation and window restoration company *cjl designs* removed some problematic panels to be refurbished in their workshop. As we report this, the panels are being returned with great care to their original positions and should all be back in place by the start of Michaelmas Term 2022.

Special Collections

In September 2021 we launched a Twitter account with the aim of connecting researchers, students and everyone else with our compelling special collections of manuscripts, early printed books and archives. Our most popular posts have included information on some eighth-century manuscript fragments from the Sacramentary for Arno of Salzburg (ca 785–821) and the marginalia present in our 1668 printing of Milton's *Paradise Lost*.

This year Keble Library has also begun work with the Bodleian's FAMOUS Project (Finding Archives and Manuscripts across Oxford's Unique Special Collections) to have a specialist catalogue the Arabic, Persian, Pashto, Turkish and other non-western language manuscripts in our collection. We are incredibly excited for these previously uncatalogued items to become searchable online. Watch this space!

Archivist

As Covid-19 lockdowns were eased, making the archives accessible again became a priority.

On 25 September, I had the great pleasure of presenting an exhibition of archival material at the 50th Anniversary celebrations for alumni who matriculated in 1970 and 1971. This was my first opportunity to speak to a group of alumni and hear their recollections of their time at Keble College. Great fun was had, especially when trying to identify individuals in matriculation photographs.

The popularity of specific documents or collections in any archive tends to correspond with either significant anniversaries or world events which prompt people to revisit historical records from a fresh perspective. 2022 marked the centenary of Martha Combe offering William Holman Hunt's 'The Light of the World' to Keble College. This prompted both celebration and research.

On Friday 20 May, Keble College hosted a conference on '*The Light of the World in Oxford*', organised by Professor Markus Bockmuehl. I was invited to provide an exhibition and was kindly allowed to display it in the side chapel, close to the painting. Despite the conference title referring to Oxford, I decided to take a more local focus. I tried to tell the story of the generous donation of the painting and the dilemmas faced by the College, in terms of whether to accept it and how to display it. This included snippets of correspondence with the somewhat disgruntled William Butterfield, who did not want the painting to be in the Chapel he had so carefully designed, letters relating to the architect J T Micklethwaite's work on the side chapel, and documents relating to the various sites it was eventually hung, including the Library and two locations in the side chapel.

There have been several visitors to the archives, all doing valuable research, and it would not be appropriate to describe each visit here; however, one visitor's work overlapped very nicely with my research on *The Light of the World* and they have kindly allowed me to summarise their work here. While most people researching *The Light of the World* at Keble focus on either Holman Hunt or Butterfield, Dr Victoria M Young (Professor of Modern Architectural History and Chair, Department of Art History, University of St Thomas) has focused on Micklethwaite. We have both discovered that there are common misunderstandings relating to the history of Holman Hunt's painting since it was given to Keble College. While I explored such myths as the idea that the College were 'bigotted goths' who disliked the painting (an accusation made by the artist), Victoria explored the often misunderstood nature of Micklethwaite's work. She looked at the various purposes of the side chapel (which was not intended simply to house the painting), the chronology and the extent of his alterations to the existing structure of the Chapel (rather than having 'built' a side chapel, he significantly remodelled the existing space—although the external stairs to the Sacristy are obviously not original). She studied both the records and the building itself. As a result, I have started to look at the Chapel rather differently too, though with just the same pleasure as before. I look forward to reading the results of her incredibly thorough research in due course.

On the subject of alterations to Butterfield's work, I have assisted the Head of Maintenance in her research on the Warden's Lodgings, showing her records of previous renovations in order to inform the approach to the current works on that building. This shows how reference to archival records can allow the past to inform the present and ensure that we remain sympathetic to our rich history.

These are only a few elements of my work. The archives continue to receive fascinating new accessions from generous donors. Aside from archives, I also have records management duties, which have seen me work with various departments on their retention schedules, as well as working to improve our approach to freedom of information.

All our boats gave it their all and achieved great results in the two main bumps regattas, Torpids in Hilary and Summer Vllls in Trinity. In Torpids, our M2 managed to bump three times in four days, only missing the goal of blades (four bumps) by one. Our M1 performed well in the highest Division 1, racing with senior and very promising novice rowers that only had started rowing in October. Against other strong college first boats, we were bumped twice but managed to defend 10th on the river in the Torpids start order. In Summer Vllls, we entered five men's boats, with senior rowers, new novices and students from other Keble sports clubs such as rugby and football participating in one of Oxford's biggest sporting events. In an exceptionally tough year, three of our boats managed to qualify or were already in fixed divisions for their starting place in Summer Vllls. Our M3 bumped its way up into men's Division 5 with three bumps in four days, again closely missing well-deserved blades and finishing as one of the highest M3s on the river. Our M2 defended his place on the river after getting bumped by a strong St. Peter's first crew on the first day and bumping St. Anne's first boat on the third day—again well done in men's Division 3, finishing as one of the highest placed M2s on the river. Our M1 started off as second on the river in men's Division 1, chasing Oriel for headship. After some initial gains in the first two days, we had to concede one place to a Christ Church M1 crew staked with world class rowers and Olympians, but defended a strong third on the river on the last day under the cheers of thousands of rowing enthusiasts, many from Keble. We cannot wait for the next season to start and build on this successful year with many of our rowers staying on in the squad and hopefully many fresh novices coming in to join in this wonderful club.

Rowing (Women)

2021/2022 was a great season for KCBC, on both the men's and women's side. This was mainly due to the good integration of the two sides of the club this year, making for a friendly and supportive environment. Freshly out of the Covid-19 restrictions from the previous academic year, the captains and coaches were keen to get out as many sessions on the water as possible and really grow the club's numbers. Particularly, my, the coaches' and the other women's captains' goal was to recruit as many women as possible, and we hosted numerous social events and rowing events in a recruitment push, including BBQs and other events. This, and the rest of the club's success this year was made possible by the continued generous support of KCBC's sponsors.

Our coaches Tom and Pete creating an excellent training programme consisting of four water sessions and four weights/erg sessions for the first crews. This resulted in the women's side being able to boat novice crews at Christchurch regatta and a returners crew at Nephthys regatta in Michaelmas. All crews enjoyed this start to the racing season.

With some harder work in Hilary and commitment to the training programme, we boated a W1 and W2 crew in Torpids 2022. The W2 were randomly placed at the bottom of the bottom division, meaning there was only one way to go from there. The W2 were fast, very fast, and bumped every day that the race was not disappointingly klaxoned. Arguably, such klaxons robbed them of deserved blades, but such is bumps racing. The W1 had an emotional campaign, with many girls returning from the summer Torpids 2021 crew which saw a disappointing result. We were keen to get our first bump as a crew. We chased down Hertford three days in a row, getting tantalisingly close every day, but rowing over the first three days. However, on the Saturday of Torpids, in a dramatic display, our W1 bumped Hertford outside of Keble boathouse. This was a real treat for all Keble spectators, and many girls in the crew highlighted this as the highlight of their time in KCBC. We celebrated in style that evening.

High from the success of the Torpids campaign, both the men's and women's squads were full of energy for our training camp in Upton-Upon-Seven in the Easter Vac. We stayed as a squad in a hostel and trained on the water twice a day, making the most of this empty and vast stretch of river. We ate as a team and analysed video footage together, in what was my personal highlight of the year. This really brought the crews together, especially as the W1 now included girls who began rowing in Michaelmas and were new to the W1.

The women were keen to take this energy into Summer Eights, where the W2, again, were robbed of blades due to klaxons. The W2 qualified as the fastest rowing-on crew, which came as a surprise to none of us, and bumped every day that they could, sometimes before reaching Donnington bridge! The W1, with no returning blues, knew they would be in for a fight in eights, with many other crews bringing back their Blues. But we relied on our fitness and strength and managed to row over for the first three days. This is no easy task in Division 1 in summer eights. Unfortunately, we were bumped by Oriol on the final day of eights. Kudos for them for putting out such a competitive crew. Nonetheless, Keble celebrated in style once again to bring to a close what was a fantastic year for KCBC.

Rugby (Men)

2021/22 saw the welcome return of college rugby after its Covid-19 induced hiatus, and the re-establishment of KCRFC as a rugby club rather than just as an excuse for socials. This transition was not without its challenges. After losing a strong cohort the previous year, and with our second years deprived of this rugby as freshers, the great majority of the team would be playing for Keble for the first time. As such, it would be fair to say that this season was one of re-building.

After a restructuring of college rugby, the season was to start with a Cuppers competition rather than the usual league campaign. First up, we faced an underpowered LMH in University Parks, and despite not being at our best, cruised through to set up a highly anticipated contest against Magdalen in the second round. Despite dominating much of the possession and having early opportunities to score, lapses of defence allowed Magdalen to gain a 12-0 lead going into half-time. After the break we were far more clinical and with two unanswered tries we led for the first time with just two minutes on the clock. Unfortunately for us in the final play of the match the referee's frequent propensity to penalise us got the better of him once again, and he granted a questionable penalty on the touchline in the final play of the game. Unfortunately this was to be the winning penalty, and saw them through to a 15-14 victory. Despite the result, this contest was the first taste of proper college rugby, and one which provided great excitement for the rest of the season. Thankfully we had the chance to end Michaelmas on a high, as we comprehensively dismantled Lincoln in the depths of Cowley, securing our place in the plate semi-final.

Hilary saw the beginning of the league campaign, which began at home against Teddy Hall. While few in the team had the pleasure of facing them before, it was well understood

that this was a must-win. Surplus motivation was provided by the presence of the Teddy supporters club, consisting of a sole member and his megaphone—a testament to their club's popularity even within their own college. Much to this lone supporter's dismay, Keble's physicality ensured we led throughout, and we came away 19–12 victors. Unfortunately this promising start to the league campaign was followed by a 20–0 loss to a strong New team (who went on to win Cuppers), and a string of injuries and Covid-19 infections which prevented the fulfilment of our following games. Before the term was over however, we faced Oriel in the plate semi-final. Two early Keble tries put us ahead but ill discipline gave Oriel the chance to respond putting them within touch. With that, the momentum swung firmly in their favour and after a sustained period of heroic try-line defence, we conceded once again in the final minutes of the match. A conversion from in front of the posts sealed our fate and we finished on the wrong side of the 14–12 scoreline.

Despite this disappointment we had one final run-out of the year at the Cuppers 7s tournament at Iffley Road. We went into the first day with great optimism that the expanses of the 7s pitch would suit Keble's famed expansive rugby and were not disappointed. We began with a highly enjoyable 21–5 win against New, and finished with a closer than expected 14–7 victory against Exeter, securing our route to finals day. The following week we returned to Iffley, with the confidence of our unbeaten run and with the long anticipated introduction of Eric Fry, HBAC's resident international prop. A hard-fought 7–0 victory in the semi-final against Hertford set up a final between Keble and a St Hilda's team awash with Blues, including some who had seemingly forgotten that they actually attended another college. Despite conceding early, a promising grubber through just before half-time looked sure to have us equalise, before it was well-dealt with by the covering Hilda's fullback. Unfortunately another Hilda's score late in the second half put the game out of reach although it was certainly a performance to be proud of.

All in all then, despite suffering some narrow losses and at times having to manage with a depleted squad, it was great to get KCRFC back up and running. Having shown lots of promise throughout the season and with an excellent incoming committee, I am confident that we will be able to build on these foundations next season.

This last year has been a year like no other in terms of access and outreach work given that the majority of this usually takes place in person and this past academic year has been characterised by successive lockdowns, online learning and Covid-19 restrictions. That being said, the amount of things Keble at Large has still managed to do this year has been incredible.

Our social media presence has grown immensely this year. Our Instagram (@kebleatlarge) has seen posts from 21 different Keble students discussing their journeys to Oxford and their experiences as students here, 29 day in the life story takeovers, 15 infographics demystifying both the Oxford admissions process and life at Oxford, and 3 IGTV videos answering questions about specific subjects.

FELLOWS' OBITUARIES

Raoul Norman Franklin

CBE, BSc, BEng, MSc, MEng, DPhil, DSc (University of Auckland), DPhil, DSc (University of Oxford), born Hamilton, New Zealand 3 June 1935, died 7 October 2021. Fellow in Engineering Science (1963–1978), Senior Dean (1967–1971), Honorary Fellow (1980–2021)

Raoul's elder son, Robert Franklin (1984) writes:

Raoul (his francophone first name commemorating his father's service as an Anzac in the First World War) came to the UK from New Zealand in 1957 with a stellar academic record in mathematics, science and engineering. He chose Oxford because he wished to study for a DPhil in the relatively young field of plasma physics under the eminent scientist Hans von Engel. But, having arrived in Oxford, he found that he had to start again at the bottom. Von Engel told him: "You have degrees from New Zealand, they are not proper degrees. You will write an essay for me every week, just like an Oxford undergraduate." In retrospect, this was a blessing in disguise and the foundation of a lifelong relationship between them. Raoul took his doctorate as a member of Christ Church in 1961. At a time when Physics and Engineering were seen as not far apart, he tutored in both subjects; and when, in 1963, Keble established its first Fellowship in Engineering Science, he joined the College in this role. He also held a University Lectureship in Engineering Science from 1966. Both his undergraduates reading Engineering and his research students in plasma physics spoke of his fearsome intellect but also of his friendliness and of the support he offered.

Raoul made a full contribution to college life. Following a notorious incident when, while the fellows and their guests, led by the Bursar, Vere Davidge, were enjoying their after-dinner port in the Senior Common Room, the undergraduates bricked up its entrance, the Senior and Junior Deans resigned. The fellows decided that responsibility for college discipline needed to be handled by someone living in college accommodation in Museum Road and closer in age to the undergraduates. Raoul fitted the bill and duly became Senior Dean. He would describe the position as an art, where the skill was appropriately to punish those responsible for pranks, while still conveying appreciation for their ingenuity.

But on one occasion the ingenuity was his. After a spate of incidents when the College's locked back gate had been kicked in by a late-returning undergraduate, the Junior Common Room was put on notice that the fine (originally £4) would double until the culprit was found or owned up. But to no avail; the incidents kept recurring. When the tariff had reached £512, Raoul was awoken at home in Museum Road one night by the noise of the back gate being kicked in yet again. He ran up Blackhall Road in his pyjamas but was unable to find the offender. Scientific reason kicked in and he caught his culprit by feeling the bonnets of the cars parked in the road to identify the one that was warm. The culprit was identified.

The breadth of Raoul's scientific interests, coupled with an aptitude for administration, made him a natural candidate to be one of the eight scientific representatives on the General Board of Faculties, which controlled 70% of the University's budget. He was appointed in 1967, at the age of 32. Three years later, he was elected its head (Vice-Chairman) and served in that position for longer than anyone else.

Raoul still found fulfilment in teaching and research but, following his stint as Vice-Chairman of the General Board, he now found himself being head-hunted by a succession of universities across the Commonwealth and, in 1978, he was appointed Vice-Chancellor of City University, London, where he was also Professor of Plasma Physics and Technology. It was a wrench to leave Keble and Oxford, but he felt Engineering Science was now properly established at Keble, with three Fellows. It was a mark of his commitment to his research pupils that he continued to supervise them on Saturdays in Oxford even after starting at City.

Raoul led the City University for twenty years until his retirement in 1998, stewarding it through a difficult period of growth and transformation, in the uncertain environment for higher education of the Thatcher years. During his tenure he had on many occasions to take very difficult decisions that he knew would impact staff significantly. By the end of his tenure, City had been transformed and rested on secure long-term financial foundations. It is testimony to the way he ran the university that staff at City recalled warmly the encouragement and collegiality Raoul brought to the post. In this, he was ably supported by his wife, Faith.

He was made an Honorary Fellow of Keble in 1980, continuing to maintain his links with the College and frequently attending the St Mark's Dinner. He endowed two prizes in Engineering and the Faith Ivens Franklin Travel Fund for graduates for course-related academic study.

He was appointed Commander of the Order of the British Empire (CBE) in 1995. In 1998, he became a Visiting Professor at the Open University, where, for more than ten years he collaborated on important and original research in plasma physics producing papers at a rate that would not have disgraced a full-time academic. Raoul chaired the Associated Examining Board from 1994 to 1998 and its successor, the Assessment and Qualifications Alliance (AQA) from 1998 to 2003. He was also active in the City of London's livery companies and was Master of the Worshipful Company of Curriers in 2002. He played a key role in setting up of a new livery company, the Worshipful Company of Educators, of which he was the Foundation Master in 2001. Fittingly, the final public appearance of this teacher, researcher and leader in education was the banquet held early in 2014 to celebrate the achievement of full livery company status in 2013.

Sadly, later retirement was not kind to Raoul, but he bore his long final illness with stoicism and fortitude, nursed unstintingly by Christine, whom he married following Faith's death.

ALUMNI OBITUARIES

We record with regret the deaths of the following Alumni. We are most grateful to relatives and friends who have supplied an appreciation or biographical details to supplement our own records.

- Robert (Bob) Andrew Alexander (1957) died on 5 April 2022 aged 85. He was educated at Reading School and then was called up for two years National Service in the Royal Navy. He came up to Keble to read English Language and Literature, played tennis and took part in dinghy sailing. He also joined the Royal Navy Reserve (1957–82) becoming a Lieutenant Commander in the Supply Branch and being awarded the Royal Navy and Royal Marine Forces Reserve Decoration. After Keble he joined the Export Sales Division of the Ford Motor Company (1960–62) and then the Export and Tinplate Sales Department of the Steel Company of Wales (1962–65). Bob then decided to leave industry for academia and became the Assistant Bursar at Dulwich College in London (1965–68). He moved to be Bursar and Clerk to the Governors of Shiplake College in Henley-on-Thames (1968–72). His next appointment was as Clerk to the Governors and Bursar of Bedales School, Petersfield (1972–87) and while there he married in 1973 his wife Rosemary Anne who sadly died in 2004. He was also the Honorary Treasurer of the Steep Lawn Tennis Club (1974–78). Bob returned to Dulwich College as Clerk to the Governors (and of Alleyns School from June 1987 including Dulwich Picture Gallery and Christ's Chapel until 1995) until he retired in August 1998. He had served on the Committee of Independent Schools Bursars Association having held the posts of Honorary Treasurer and Vice-Chairman. He was a Member of the UK Council of the Institute of Chartered Secretaries (1997–2001) and Chairman of its Education Administrators Pond (1994–96). His son Charlie wrote: 'My father was very proud of his time at Keble and regularly brought our family to visit the College including boating on the Thames. He made friends for life at the College, notably the Rev Lt Col Paul Abram—they were each other's best men at their weddings and remained close to the end.'
- Rodney Gray Ansell (1953) died on 22 June 2021 aged 88. Born in Wistaston in 1933 he was educated at Nantwich and Acton County Grammar School. After two years National Service he came up to Keble to read Theology. After graduation he moved to St Stephen's House in Oxford to prepare for ordination but after one year he decided to teach. He was appointed as Assistant Master at Queen Elizabeth Grammar School, Middleton, Lancashire (1956–57). His son Gareth wrote: 'He spent the rest of his working years teaching at Nantwich and Acton Grammar School and then as Head of Divinity at Malbank Comprehensive School, Nantwich. After retirement he enjoyed planning walks and had a series of international walking books published by Sunflower Books (including *Landscapes of Menorca* and *Landscapes of Brittany*). He was proud of his association with Keble and always looked forward to reading his copy of *The Brick*. He passed away peacefully at Gloucester Royal Infirmary after a short illness. He is survived by his wife Helen, three children and ten lovely grandchildren.'
- Brian Michael Armes (1958) died on 10 July 2021 aged 82. His wife Margaret sent the following: 'Brian attended the Perse School in Cambridge, travelling every day by train from Saffron Walden where he lived. Those daily train journeys were the beginning of his lifelong love of trains and travelling. He went up to Keble College Oxford to read Engineering Science and while there joined the Debating Society and the Oxford University Railway Society. During his time as Secretary of the Society he was invited by British Rail to the official celebrations and naming of "Evening Star" the last steam engine built by them. After graduation he went to work for Ferranti International at Wythenshawe and Stockport holding a variety of posts from Development Engineer, Project Engineer, Sales Manager (Communications Systems) and Group Manager at Cheadle Heath. He moved south to initially work for GEC/Marconi when Ferranti went into receivership in December 1993. He finished a long career working for BAE Systems. In retirement he developed a love for gardening and playing Petanque. He continued to enjoy travelling and was lucky to have the opportunity to enjoy many of the iconic train journeys around the world. He enjoyed sharing these experiences with the local U3A (University of the 3rd Age), writing and presenting talks to the Steam and Transport group. His family, wife Margaret, their four children Christopher, Robert, Stuart and Fiona and especially his eight grandchildren were very much the centre of his retirement. He enjoyed sharing with the youngsters his many experiences from around the world.'
- Iain Morrison Aylwin (1945) died on 16 June 2022 aged 94. Educated at Wrekin College, Wellington in Shropshire he came up to Keble for a wartime degree. He was called-up for military service and was commissioned into the Loyal Regiment in 1948. Iain married Marie Madeleine Jeanne Chantal de Lussy in 1951. He was promoted Captain (1953) and Major (1961) having passed the Technical Staff College and was Assistant Military Attaché in Moscow in 1962. After leaving the Army he was Director of the Argos Fishing Company in Port Stanley in the Falkland Islands. Iain retired to live in Guillemont, Montsieu, Port-Ste-Marie in France where he died. We were informed of his death by his son Idris.

- Arthur Michael Cannon (1950) died on 21 June 2022 aged 93. He was educated at Kingswood School and after two years National Service came up to Keble to read Physics. While at Keble he became an Associate of the Royal College of Organists (ARCO, 1951). His son Andrew wrote: 'A M Cannon, a Methodist, was admitted to Keble when the Anglican-Methodist conversations were ongoing. In his second year he became Secretary of the Oxford University John Wesley Society. After Keble he worked briefly in the Research Department of ICI at Billingham (1953-55) and then as a Lecturer at the National College of Food Technology (1955-63). While a Lecturer he gained from London University a MSc in Physics and a Bachelor of Divinity (BD). He entered Richmond College to train for the Methodist Ministry.' In 1966 he was appointed Minister in the Methodist Church in Blackburn and then moved to the Methodist Church in Carshalton. In 1983 he became the Superintendent Minister of the Clevedon Methodist Circuit. 'Clevedon was where the Rev John Smart (Keble 1955) was one of the Anglican Priests. Working together through the local Council of Churches, these two founded "Clevedon Care"—a social service run by the churches which in 2010 received the Queen's Award for Voluntary Service. The ARCO Diploma gained while at Keble was put to good use in retirement as Michael Cannon served for twenty years as Organist at Penrith Methodist Church.'
- Philip John Capes (1975) died on 19 July 2021 aged 68. Philip went to the University of Exeter in 1972 and graduated in 1975 with a BSc in Engineering. He came up to Keble for the Postgraduate Certificate in Education. He was Deputy Head of Warminster School a co-educational independent school in Wiltshire and Headmaster of St Bees School, Cumbria (2000-2012). While at St Bees he gained an MA in Leadership and Management from the Open University. In retirement he returned to Exeter in Devon. He is survived by his wife Helen.
- John Richard Chester (1957) died on 7 April 2022 aged 86. He was educated at Monkton Combe School, Bath and came up to Keble to read Law. He rowed in the College 1st Eight (1957-61) and was Captain of Boats 1958-59. In 1958 he rowed in a University IV in the Visitors Cup at Henley and in 1960 for the University VIII and became a member of Vincent's Club. John also rowed in the Great Britain VIII in the Rome Olympic Games in 1960. He graduated in 1961 (the College having granted him an extra year) and he went to Clifton Theological College (1961-63) but did not become a priest. He was appointed an Assistant Master at Canford School in Dorset (1963-66). John studied at the Columbia Business School, New York for an MBA in Business Administration (1966-68), remained in the USA for three years before returning to work in the UK (1971-75). He then decided to make use of his law degree and joined Messrs Kitson and Trotman in Beaminster, Dorset to train as a Solicitor (1976-78). He moved to Messrs D'Angiban and Mahim (1979-91) before setting up his own firm John Chester and Co in Bournemouth (1991-95). In retirement his main interest was in refurbishing a house in South Brittany with the aim of moving to France but he died in his home in Bournemouth.
- Alan Roger Davis (1965) died at the end of October 2021 aged 76. Educated at King Edward VI Grammar School, Aston, Birmingham he came up to Keble to read Music. His wife Eira wrote: 'He sang in the College choir as well as taking part and presenting many musical performances at Keble and at the University, in the Holywell Music room for example, conducting, playing the clarinet and the recorder. His future activities centred around the recorder as a teacher, player, composer and conductor mostly in Birmingham. His love for jazz was certainly cemented by contact with Humphrey Carpenter at Keble (1964).' After Keble Alan carried out postgraduate research on the music of Hotteterre at Birmingham University. He held recorder teaching appointments at Birmingham Conservatoire, Birmingham Music Service, the Royal Scottish Academy of Music and Drama, Chetham's School of Music and the Junior Department of the Royal Northern College of Music. In 1979 he founded Birmingham Schools Recorder Sinfonia which he directed until 2010. He performed as a soloist, as a member of small baroque ensembles, the Trio Faronell and the Trio Filidori. Alan was active as a composer, editor and arranger. He particularly enjoyed writing for children and amateur players. In the 1980s failing sight began to curtail his performing and the major part of his subsequent career was devoted to teaching. He leaves a wife Eira and children Ruth, James and Mary.
- Norman Cassienet Evans (1950) died on 12 July 2022 aged 91. He was educated at Tonbridge School in Kent and then called-up for two years National Service. Like his father Arthur Norman Evans (Keble 1919), he came up to Keble to read Classics. He was a member of the College Tenmantale History Society and played rugby (Captain 1952), hockey, cricket and sailed with the Yacht Club. He also played rugby, hockey and cricket for the University Clubs and was a member of the Oxford Inter-Collegiate Christian Union. Norman was President of the JCR (1952-53) and a member of the College Debating Society. After graduation he was appointed Assistant Master at Canford School in Dorset (1954-57). In 1961 Norman married Janet Margaret Hart and they had a daughter Philippa born in 1962 and a son Peter born in 1967. His last teaching post was as Housemaster and Teaching Master at Charterhouse (1970-85). He later decided to train for the Church being ordained Deacon (1995) and Priest (1996) and officiated in the parishes of Puttenham, Wanborough and Seale in the Guildford Diocese. He is survived by his wife Margaret, daughter Philippa, son Peter, grandchildren and great grandchildren.

- Herbert Frederick Giraud Floate (1947) died on 17 March 2021 aged 95. He was educated at Steyning Grammar School, West Sussex and after four years military service he came up to Keble to read Geography. He spent a year at Queen's College, Birmingham before being appointed an Assistant Master at Sprowston Grammar School (1951–53) and then at Kimbolton School (1953–58). He moved to St Andrew's School, Mauritius (1958–61), was ordained Deacon (1961) and Priest (1963) being Curate-in-Charge of Anse Royale in the Seychelles (1961–62). Returning to the UK he was Assistant Master at Carrer's Grammar School, Sleaford (1963–65) being also Honorary Assistant Curate of Quarrington with Old Sleaford (1963–65) and Priest-in-Charge of Mareham-le-Fen (1965–66). He travelled to Western Australia to be Assistant Chaplain of Christ Church Grammar School, Claremont (1966–67) before becoming a Lecturer at the University of Western Australia (1967–72). Returning again to the UK he was Rector of Stroxtun in Lincolnshire (1972–74) and also Rector of Harlaxton with Wyville and Hungerton (1972–74). He was a Lecturer at Shenstone New College, Worcestershire (1974–78) and then Priest-in-Charge of St George's, Redditch (1978–79) becoming Rector of Upton Snodsbury Broughton Hackett with the Flyfords and North Piddle (1984–89). His last appointment before retiring was as Chaplain of Mojacar in Spain (1989–91). His wife Nora had pre-deceased him.
- Philip Robin Templer Graves (1978) Philip Robin Templer Graves (1978) died on 11 January 2022 aged 63. Educated at Stowe School he came up to Keble to read PPE. He was a member of the College Squash Club and stayed on in Oxford for the Postgraduate Certificate in Education (1982–83). He attended the Strathclyde University Business School for an MBA (1990–91) and Strathclyde University for a MSc in Environmental Studies (2009–10). Philip was a Partner in Graves Consultancy (2009–12) which helped financial experts understand the environmental sector and environmentalists understand finance. He was also Fund Manager of the Munro Fund (2011–13) managing and marketing a UK dedicated fund with a simple formula, low cost and ideal for long term investors and pension funds. He was appointed a Senior Business Consultant at the Stirling Corporate Office of SEPA (Scottish Environment Protection Agency) (2013–19) where he was involved in writing strategy documents and editing the Annual Report and Accounts. He then became a self-employed Environmental Specialist in Strathblane, Stirling. For a year in 2019 he was a Trustee of the John Muir Trust. He is survived by his wife Susan.
- William (Bill) Groves (1961) died on 30 August 2021 aged 79. He was educated at the Royal Liberty Grammar School, Romford. His wife Carol wrote: 'My husband William Groves (Bill) has recently died having suffered from Parkinson's for some years. He studied Geology at Keble between 1961–64 and subsequently for the Diploma in Education in 1965. He played soccer for the University (left back) including two Varsity matches and became a member of Vincent's. He also played cricket for Keble. Bill became a teacher of geology at Brierley Hill Grammar School and then in a number of schools in the West Midlands. He became Deputy Head in a large comprehensive, High Arcal School, Sedgley, Dudley (1974–87). He moved to be a Lecturer in Earth Science at King Edward VI School, Stourbridge. During his teaching career he was football coach for many school teams. He is survived by his wife Carol and his son John.'
- Desmond Ian Gosford Hall (1959) died on 10 May 2022 aged 82. He was born in Georgetown, Guyana. His father was the first black officer to join the Royal Air Force in World War II and he stayed in the UK to study dentistry at Guy's Hospital. In 1952 Ian moved to London to join his father and attended Archbishop Tenison's School in Kensington. He taught himself classical piano and came up to Keble to read Music. He played football for the College and for the University Centaurs Team. He was also in both the College and University Centipedes Athletics Teams. He was appointed Assistant Master at Tulse Hill School (1962) and Forest Hill School (1963). Ian who was an Associate of the Royal College of Organists, was Assistant Organist at St Martin-in-the-Fields, sang at Southwark Cathedral and the Sunday evening choir at St Paul's Cathedral. He also obtained a PhD in Ethnomusicology from London University. He went to Ghana as Director of Music at Achimota School (1964–66) but returned to London to teach at Peckham Comprehensive School and be Organist and Director of Music at the Church of Christ the King in Bloomsbury (1968) and after seven years went to the Church of St Michael's in Chester Square, Belgravia. He was an Advisor in Multi Ethnic Studies for the Inner London Education Authority and a Research Associate at the School of Oriental and African Studies. In 1970 he founded the Bloomsbury International Society to promote racial harmony and he was the Chairman of the UK Committee for Festac 77, the second World Black Festival of Arts and Culture held in Lagos, Nigeria. Over the years his talents as a composer and musician enabled him to perform internationally. In 1982 he was appointed Specialist Consultant to the United Nations Center Against Apartheid and in 2000 he was asked by Kofi Annan to be Ambassador-at-Large of a network of charitable organisations called the World Association of Non-Governmental Organizations (WANGO). He was made an Honorary Professor of the University of Sierra Leone (1996) and the University of Ghana (1997). Ian married his first wife Gillian Frances Hollowell in 1964, his second wife Radha died in 2011 and his son died in 2009.

David Malcolm Hallworth
(1950)

died on 25 April 2020 aged 90. Educated at Shrewsbury he was then called-up for two years National Service. His daughter Sarah sent the following obituary: 'David gained a place to study Law at Keble (on the strength of his golf, he always said!) and at the inspired suggestion of Kek his former master at Shrewsbury. He loved his time at Keble and made the most of the opportunity to play lots of golf, including in the College Golf Cuppers which he won alongside Keith Thomas and John Milner. David played for the University's golf team between 1951–53 and received a Blue for golf and Half Blue for Eton Fives. Having studied law David became a Solicitor in Manchester. After twenty years as a Partner in Hall Brydon & Co, he joined Foysters (later DWF) in 1979. David played for twenty consecutive years in the annual golf match between the Council of the Manchester and the Council of the Liverpool Law Society. He was appointed to sit on a special committee of the Council of the Manchester Law Society to examine its workings and constitution. David was received into the Catholic Church at the Easter vigil in 1979 and sang in the St Vincent's Choir for over forty years. He was a member of the St Vincent de Paul Society, serving as President. David lived in Altrincham, Cheshire all his life. He was married to Joan Stewart Arnold in May 1959. David and Joan had three daughters Alison, Claire and Sarah and three granddaughters.'

Anthony Max Hill (1969)

died on 1 April 2022 aged 76. He was one of the first entry to the new University of Lancaster graduating with a degree in French in 1967. Max visited Paris in 1968, managed to survive the riots and came up to Keble for the Postgraduate Certificate in Education. He played badminton, hockey and cricket for the College and was a member of the University Hockey Club. His first teaching post was at Guthlaxton School in Wigston, Leicestershire (1970–73), followed by his appointment as Head of Modern Languages at Prince William School in Oundle (1973–84). Max became Deputy Head at Chenderit School in Middleton Cheney, Oxfordshire (1984–88) and then moved to Essex to be Headmaster of Notley High School in Braintree (1988–93). His last appointment was as Headteacher of Sandy Upper School (1993–2000) after which he was Schools Programme Manager for World Challenge Expeditions. His daughter Natalie wrote: 'At Lancaster Max was an avid sportsman and he was still playing and administrating in cricket until his death. With his infectious humour and innocent wind-ups, he was a wonderful teammate. He loved fishing and encouraged many pupils to follow him. Max became a member of Sandy Town Council in 2015 having previously involved himself with many organisations including The Twinning Association (forging a new link with Skarszewy in Poland), with the Sandy Sports and Leisure Association and was also a keen supporter of events including the annual Carnival and the Christmas Lights Switch-on. He was instrumental in the compiling of the Sandy and Beeston Town Plan, 2011–2020 and at the time of his death was Chairman of Sandy Town Council's Human Resources Committee and member of several others. Max leaves his wife Ros, daughters Natalie and Liz and four granddaughters.'

Graham Stanley Hood (1956)

died on 6 September 2021 aged 84. Educated at King Edward VI Grammar School, Stratford-upon-Avon, after two years National Service he followed his brother Derek (1952) by reading History at Keble. He was a member of the College Table Tennis Team, President of the Mitre Club and JCR Secretary (1957–58). He studied for the Diploma in the History of Art at the Courtauld Institute (1959–61). In 1960 he had met Gale an American who was studying drama in his home town, Stratford-upon-Avon and he decided to follow her back to the United States. They were married in August 1961 and he became Curator of the Wadsworth Atheneum Museum of Art in Hartford, Connecticut. Graham moved to New Haven as Curator of the Yale University Art Gallery and then to the Detroit Institute of Art as Curator of American Art. In 1971 he accepted a position at Colonial Williamsburg as Vice President for Collections and Museums and the Carlisle H Humelsine Chief Curator until he retired in December 1997. While at Williamsburg he led the renovation of the historic Governor's Palace and oversaw the planning and construction of the DeWitt Wallace Decorative Arts Museum. He taught decorative arts courses occasionally at the University of Michigan, the College of William and Mary and the University of Virginia. After his retirement he was on the Board of Trustees for Kenmore House in Fredericksburg and he led the renovation project of the Old Thomas James Historic Store in Mathews County. Graham was a member of the Mathews County Master Gardeners group for many years. He enjoyed reading, classical music, eighteenth and nineteenth century art, European travel and especially being with his family and his dogs. He is survived by his wife of sixty years Gale, daughter Sarah Hood Lynch, son Jorin Hood (wife Suzanne) and grandchildren Denny, Molly, Evan and Will Lynch.

Jonathan David James (1980)

died on 12 October 2020 aged 58. He was educated at Dwn-Y-Felin Comprehensive School and came up to Keble to read Metallurgy, Economics and Management. He played cricket and hockey for the College and was a member of the Boat Club. Jonathan was also a member of the University Hockey, Rugby Union Football, Cricket and Boat Clubs. He was a member of the College Junior Common Room Committee, the Oxford University Students Union Representative and the Industrial Society Visits Officer. He returned to Wales for a PhD in Materials Science at Swansea University (1988). He was appointed a Senior Research Officer in the Department of Engineering at the University of Wales, Swansea. His research included

fingerprint detection, metal powder production, high temperature testing of metals and computer simulation. Jonathan is survived by his wife Karen and son Thomas.

Olivia Caroline Jelley (1998) died on 14 January 2022 aged 41. Her brother Thomas writes: 'Olivia loved learning. While competing successfully as a teenage Surrey County Athletics sprinter, she won a scholarship to study for A-Levels at The Lady Eleonor Holles School and from there a place to read Physiology at Keble. Early in her first year of studies Olivia came to feel that perhaps looking down the microscope at cells was not her real calling and so, having won several sixth form prizes for literature and achieved a top grade in A-Level English she switched courses. Almost equally comfortable in the arts and the sciences Olivia combined them to become a yoga instructor, a personal trainer, try her hand at sailing and mountaineering, but her strongest passion remained in language and learning. A CELTA (Certificate in Teaching English to Speakers of Other Languages) qualified teacher, Olivia taught teenagers and young adults from diverse backgrounds. At first she focused on English language but before long, students and parents alike proved keen to draw on Olivia's skills and knowledge in French, Spanish, Maths and the Sciences. Whilst living in Portland, Oregon, Olivia taught at Portland Community College and Portland English Language Academy forming close learning bonds with students from challenging backgrounds including recent arrivals to the US for whom English was not a first language. This experience and the desire to push her professional commitment to teaching further drove Olivia back to Oxford in 2017 for a MSc in Applied Linguistics and Second Language Acquisition. Her dissertation was on the experience of a young non-native English speaker's language learning in the US. In 2019 Olivia joined a global language school at its headquarters in Lucerne, Switzerland. There she helped produce educational products and content for a global body of 75,000 teachers and two million students, developed guidelines to meet the needs of stakeholders in a variety of international markets. After her team were deeply impacted by the Covid-19 pandemic, Olivia moved to a communications role at a medical foundation and supported Cambridge English examinations in her spare time. Olivia first took anti-depressants in her first year at Oxford, soon after her eighteenth birthday. Over the years she became determined to step away from the 'numbness' she felt and live her life fully with emotional technicolour. With great courage, discipline and determination, despite suffering serious setbacks along the way, Olivia tapered her dosage in a bid to withdraw from SSRIs (selective serotonin reuptake inhibitors). Compounded by the isolation and loneliness of the pandemic, without the support and guidance that she needed, Olivia's mental health deteriorated very rapidly during the autumn of 2021 and the winter until on 14 January 2022 she ended her life aged 41 years.'

Peter Meyricke Jones (1972) died on 2 December 2021 aged 67. His partner Deborah Pullen sent the following: 'It was as a schoolboy in Plymouth that Peter discovered one of the great and lasting passions of his life—music. At Plymouth College he formed his own Jazz Trio in which he played double bass alongside friends on drums and piano. They were very good and one of the members went on to play professionally with the Zurich Symphony Orchestra. Following in the footsteps of his father (Keble 1927) and grandfather (Keble 1895) Peter went up to Keble studying PPE. He loved his time there, a highlight of which was sharing a flat with the young Imran Khan. After leaving Oxford he worked for a student travel organisation in Italy learning how to cook and cementing a love for the country before starting a career in advertising at Doyle Dane Bernbach, the first of many renowned agencies that he worked for in London. He was responsible for the famous "Drinking and Driving Wrecks Lives" campaign of the late eighties and later in the 1990s he won the business for the NatWest account. From his earliest years Peter diligently supported Plymouth Argyle through thin and thinner times. He became firm friends with fellow Plymouthian and Argyle Michael Foot with whom he realised his boyhood ambitions serving as a Director of the club from 2001 to 2005 (during which time the team was promoted to the Championship) and then later served as a non-executive Director. Under Peter's tenures the club enjoyed three promotions and suffered no relegations, an impressive statistic which he used to, proudly but amusingly, claim made him the most successful Director in the history of the club. When Michael died, Peter delivered a funny and moving eulogy at his funeral and raised £50,000 for the memorial that stands to him in Plymouth's Freedom Park. Latterly working as an independent consultant, he re-positioned Christie's auction house and famously rebranded Plymouth as "Britain's Ocean City", emphasising the city's strengths and rich seafaring history. Most recently he developed the brand campaign "Exeter Live Better", promoting the lifestyle benefits of the city. His exotic mix of Danish and Welsh blood notwithstanding, he was a fiercely proud Devonian and a keen family historian, spending time researching his local ancestors; in particular the architect Arthur Southcombe Parker. Peter loved trains, walking, nature and politics. He had an enviable encyclopaedic knowledge of music—a soundtrack for every occasion. He was never more comfortable than when in the kitchen cooking predominantly Italian food for family and friends or pottering in the garden. A private and undemonstrative man, he was a proud father to Anna and Louisa by his ex-wife Bettina and most recently grandfather to Ella and Leo. For the past twenty plus years Peter lived with his partner Deborah, splitting their time between London and Devon. All those close to him will miss his wonderful hospitality, his sheer good company and his unique ability to amuse and be amused.'

- William (Bill) Henry Barry Key (1948) died on 16 February 2021 aged 98. His son David sent the following: ‘William Henry Barry (‘Bill’) was born in Gloucester in 1923 to modest circumstances, his father was a secretary at a local hospital, his mother kept house. Bill attended the local grammar school where he excelled both academically and on the cricket and rugby fields. The family moved to Worcester where he attended Kings and then Worcester Royal Grammar School. War came calling and he served as a young officer in Europe in the Royal Artillery, then subsequently fulfilling peace keeping duties in the Far East. On his return he attended Keble, where he read Geography and took the Postgraduate Diploma in Education. For four years he was in the Keble Rugby XV, the last as Captain. He trialled for the University XV, which in those days was often a stepping stone to the fabled England XV—a fair player. On graduating he embarked on a long teaching career, Assistant Master, Magdalen College School, Brackley (1952–56), Keighley Boys Grammar School (1956–59), Pembroke Grammar School (1960–64), Crown Woods School, Eltham (1964–65) and finally retiring in 1988 after many years as a housemaster and latterly Deputy Head Master at Bethany School in Kent. In 1990, Bill and his beloved wife Anne moved to Witney, one of the reasons being near to Oxford, as he always attended the Keble dinners. He took great pride in admitting he was often the oldest one there, enjoying the status of sitting on the top table. In 2012 I was visiting and he asked me to drive him to Oxford so we could view Keble. He showed me around, misty eyed, pointing out the buildings and locations that helped forge this man. Small in stature, big in heart, loyal, modest, popular and generous to the end. Missed greatly by his family and anyone who knew Bill.’ His wife Anne died in 2011 but he is survived by their sons David and Richard.
- Michael (Mike) John Lambert (1959) died on 2 April 2021 aged 81. Roger Sainsbury (1959) a contemporary and friend wrote as follows: ‘Mike grew up in Preston, where his father was a barrister and then a judge. He came up to Keble from Merchant Taylors School, Crosby and read Engineering. His main extra-curricular activity was the running of the bar at the University Yacht Club, then in premises in Keble road. With his business acumen and organising skills and his congenial, clubbable manner he was well suited to this role. While up at Oxford he met local girl Chris who was to become his wife. During vacations he worked for BICC, going to the top of 1,000 ft television masts. His first employment was with BICC, followed by stints with ICI and Robert McAlpine (1972–76) before he returned to masts and towers with the Independent Broadcasting Authority (1976–83) where he rose to become head of that department. He also became a Fellow of the Institute of Civil Engineers. He moved to become Group Manager and Chief Structural Engineer for NTL (1983–98) before becoming a part-time self-employed consultant. Mike was a great servant of the Keble Association. In 1999 the KA was being restructured and he took on the key job of Membership Secretary. Aided by his wife Chris, he moved the KA records and system into the digital age and continued in that role until 2008. For most of this time he and Chris lived near Romsey in Hampshire, much visited by their three daughters and three grandchildren, in a home enlivened by Mike’s unusual facility for highly imaginative witticisms. For many years they were keen apiarists, not just producing honey but playing a serious part in the world of bees, exhibiting at shows, lecturing and hosting a library. Mike was also Chairman of the Hampshire Bee Keeping Association. More recently his interest was genealogy. A man of substance who will be greatly missed.’
- Adrian Alan Mcinnes (1975) died on 3 April 2022 aged 64. He was educated at Yeovil College and came up to Keble to read Classics. Adrian was a member of the College chapel choir and a member of the College Preceptors. He also sang in the University Singing Club (OUSC). He went to St Luke’s College, Exeter University for the Postgraduate Certificate of Education (1980). He was appointed Head of Classics at Papplewick School, Ascot in Berkshire (1980–84), then Cranborne Chase School, Tisbury, Salisbury (1984–89) and Atherley School, Southampton (1989–92). He moved to Bristol and was a Classics Teacher at Clifton College (1992–94) before being made Head of Classics at Mander Portman Woodward College, Bristol (1994–96). Adrian then taught at St Mary Redcliffe and Temple, a comprehensive school where he managed to keep both Latin and Greek to A level in the only state school in the city to offer any classics. Apart from the ancient world his main interest was music and he played the organ for over twenty years at two Bristol churches, St Paul’s, Southville and Failand. He died unexpectedly from sudden heart failure. Tributes at his funeral from a colleague, a neighbour and a church warden all described him as eccentric and academic but were said with affection. He had no heating in his home and only drove Rover Metros until they disintegrated beyond repair.
- Robert Harvey Nokes (1958) died on 26 November 2021 aged 82. David Bell (1957), a friend of Robert who first met him when they were both at Highgate School, writes: ‘At Keble Robert read History, was involved in Chapel affairs and became President of the John Keble Society. He was also a member of Tenmantale and the Oxford University Church Society. Stephen Chappell (1958) recalls that Robert and he went with a group to the Oberammergau Passion Play. They were caught with the Warden, Eric Abbott (later Dean of Westminster) in the middle of a lake in a paddle boat by a sudden storm. The Warden seemed to “still the waters” whilst they paddled like mad for the shore. From Keble Robert went on to Queen’s College, Birmingham and was ordained in 1964. He served as Curate in Totteridge (1963–67) and then Dunstable (1967–73), before becoming Vicar of St Andrew’s, Langford in Bedfordshire (1973–90). He

re-entered my life when he moved to the next-door parish to become Rector of Braughing with Furneux Pelham and Stocking Pelham. My wife and I were invited to his induction at St Mary's, Braughing and at last met his wife Mary whom he had married in 1970 and his two children Debbie and Andrew. He was a great family man. He retired in 2004 to Hanslope in Buckinghamshire but delayed his departure from Braughing because a terrible murder took place in Furneux Pelham and he stayed to support the shocked village. Once in Hanslope he quickly became involved in the ministry of the parish of St James the Great. During his life he was deeply influenced by three study periods at St George's College, Jerusalem and served on its British Regional Committee until 2018. He was always well-organised and had prepared his "very last Order of Service"—his own funeral. He had also prepared his 2021 Christmas missive, which Mary decided to send to its usual recipients. She added a short picture history of his life including one of Robert looking splendid in his Mackenzie tartan kilt. Poignantly his letter concluded with how he and Mary expected to spend Christmas.'

Thomas Oliver (1955)

died on 29 September 2021 aged 87. Educated at William Hulme Grammar School in Manchester he came up to Keble after two years National Service to read Chemistry. He was Captain of the University 2nd Lacrosse XII and President of the University Iroquois Club (1956–57). He joined the Shell International Chemical Company in London (1959–63). He married Jean Roberts in 1963 and transferred to the Shell Chemical Company (Philippines) in Manila. We were notified of his death by his daughter Rachel Oliver.

James Henry Pain (1963)

died on 9 July 2022 aged 92. He was born in Los Angeles, California and educated at Belmont High School and then Occidental College (1947–51). He moved to Madison, New Jersey on the East Coast to study for a Bachelor of Divinity at Drew University (1951–54) where he met his wife-to-be Gail. James was ordained a Methodist Minister and became Drew University Chaplain. He remained at Drew University for the next sixty-five years becoming Henry and Annie M Pfeiffer Professor of Religion and Dean of the Caspersen School of Graduate Studies. Once asked about his longevity at Drew he responded "I stayed so long, perhaps I am a monument to inertia." He took weekly chapel services and gave seminars on spirituality, church history and the Inklings, specifically C S Lewis and Charles Williams with whom he had interacted during his time at Keble for a Doctor of Philosophy in Theology (1963–66). His deep voice lent itself to leading worship in services and to being the "Voice of Drew" in radio advertisements. His colleagues described him as having a kind and quiet nature, an unassuming smile and a love of intellectual discourse whether in a classroom or over a glass of scotch or a strong cup of tea. He was predeceased by his wife of forty years, Gail, but is survived by a daughter Julien Drennan (husband Bryan) and a son Jameson Pain (wife Kittie) and three grandsons Colin Drennan, Shane Drennan and Brodie Pain.

Maurice George Payn (1949)

died on 28 May 2022 aged 92. Educated at Simon Langton Grammar School for Boys, Canterbury he was called-up for two years National Service before coming up to Keble to read English. He was President of the College Essay Club (1952) and stayed on for the Postgraduate Diploma in Education. He was appointed an Assistant Master teaching English at Brigg Grammar School in Lincolnshire (1953–62) and then moved to King Edward VII School, Lytham (1962–65). In 1965 he became the first person to be appointed Educational Adviser for English in the County of Cumberland tasked in particular with the development of spoken English. He gained the Diploma in Reading Development from the Open University (1970). In 1974 he was appointed Chief Education Adviser and Chief Inspector of Schools for the new County of Cumbria. A programme of in-service training for teachers was further developed and with the then Director of Education he was instrumental in setting up the County's residential centre at Higham Hall on Bassenthwaite. In the 1980s the emphasis of his work changed to monitoring the performance of schools rather than on curriculum development. In retirement in Cumbria he has been active with the National Park Authority, a Committee Member of the Lakeland Horticultural Society and gained a Certificate in Nature Conservation from Newcastle University. At a meeting of the Douglas Price Society in Keble he remarked: "I constantly look back on my years at Keble with great pleasure and affection, realising how that memorable experience was the essential key to a subsequent long and rewarding career in the field of education: thank you Keble most sincerely." His wife Heather died in 2008 but he leaves children Timothy, Rebecca and Elizabeth, grandchildren Katie, Alice and Helen, daughter-in-law Barbara and sons-in-law Alan and John.

Gordon James Pocock (1951)

died on 21 August 2021 aged 88. He was educated at the Royal Liberty School, Romford and came up to Keble to read English. He joined the Post Office and after four years was appointed Private Secretary to the Director General (1958–59) before becoming a Principal (1960), Assistant Secretary (1968) and Deputy Director (1972–76). Gordon became Director of External Telecommns (1976–79) and after a year as Director of Telecommns Marketing he was made a Senior Director retiring in 1981. He became Chief Executive of Merlin Business Systems, British Telecommunications (1981) and then a Director of Communications-Educational Services for Fellow, Nolan Norton and Co (1985). Gordon had published *Corneille and Racine*, 1973 and *Boileau and the Nature of Neo-Classicism*, 1980. His interests included travel, theatre and local history but these were curtailed in his final

years by the loss of his sight. His wife Audrey whom he had married in 1954 had died in 1990 and he lived alone.

Peter Jonathan Rawlins (1969) died on 28 May 2022 aged 71. Educated at St Edward's School in Oxford he read English at Keble. He was a member of the College Centenary Ball Committee and appeared in front of Princess Margaret in the College's centenary production of Pre-Raphaelites. He was a member of Oxford University Dramatic Society (OUDS) and was a member and President of Oxford University Etceteras (Experimental Theatre). He joined Arthur Andersen and Co (1972–85), became a Partner (1983) and Head of Practice Development in 1984. He was Personal Assistant to the Chief Executive of Lloyd's of London from 1983 to 1984 where he helped to deliver the reforms required to allow the world's oldest and largest insurance market to survive. Peter moved to be Managing Director of Sturge Holdings Plc (1985–89) the largest underwriting agency group at Lloyd's and then Financial Services Industry Portfolio Director of West Europe Region London Stock Exchange (1989–93). In 1994 he set up Rawlins Strategy Consulting with himself as Managing Director. He was Director and Member of the Supervisory Board of Accenture (1995), Chairman of Scala Business Solutions N.V. (1998–2000) and Higham Group Plc (2004–05). Peter was also a regular Business School Lecturer, the Director of several UK national Performing Arts Schools and of London First, the Chairman of the Michael Palin Centre for Stammering in Children and an elected Fellow of the Royal Society of Arts. In his spare time he enjoyed tennis, rugby, shooting, travelling, wine, the arts and the UK national heritage. His family wrote: 'He had an unrivalled passion for Keble and for many decades he devoted himself to its continued success, becoming a member of the Warden's Advisory Committee. At his best, he was magnetic, sparkling and charismatic—a perpetual life force who lit up rooms with the sheer vitality of his personality, his sense of fun and his boundless energy. For the past fifteen years Peter bravely battled Multiple Sclerosis with courage and without complaint. His life motto—you snooze, you lose—was put into full effect as he hurtled around, not letting a life-limiting, degenerative illness stand in the way of anything. Despite his MS his brain remained as sharp as ever. He is greatly missed by his wife Christina and his six children Juliette, Oliver, Georgia, Sam, Kit and Joe.'

David Henry Smyly (1960) died on 26 November 2021 aged 80. He was born in Maidenhead the son of Colonel Dennis Douglas Pilkington Smyly and his wife the former Hon Dorothy Margaret Berry. He was educated at Eton College and then spent a year as an Assistant Master at Wellesley House Preparatory School in Broadstairs (1959–60). He came up to Keble to read Law and played cricket for the College. David was a member of the University Point to Point Team and Joint-Master of the Drag Hunt. He became a member of the Bullingdon Club. In 1963 David married Patricia Kathleen Evetts in Cheltenham, Gloucestershire. He joined Whitbread and Company (1964–68) and moved to Fenn and Crosthwaite for a year (1968–69). David then became a Stud Partner and Stock Market Trader (1970–96) and was a member of the Jockey Club from 1975 to 1985 and Bloodstock Agent (1987–1996) being the sole proprietor of David Smyly Bloodstock Ltd. He was also Master of the Drag. He is survived by his wife Patricia, daughter Susannah Louise, son Giles Richard Ismay and grandson Harry de Ferry Foster.

Edward (Ted) John Thomas (1959) died on 23 July 2021 aged 83. Roger Sainsbury (1959), a friend and contemporary sent the following obituary: 'Ted Thomas grew up in Cornwall, his father dying when he was quite young. He was educated at Devonport High School for Boys and came up to Keble to read Physics after National Service in the Royal Artillery. He was much involved with the College Sailing Club and the University Yacht Club. He was President of the University Scientific Society. Ted was also involved, in another sense, with Erica (Botany, St Hilda's) who was to become his wife. His first employment was in the Research Laboratories of GEC (1962–64) during which he gained an MSc from the University of London. As he wanted to do pure research he took an Assistant Lecturer post at Manchester University (1964–68) obtaining a PhD (1968). From there he moved to Bristol as a Staff Tutor in the Extra-Mural Department of the University eventually becoming Professor of Continuing Education and Head of Department. He became much involved in issues of harmonisation within the European Union which required a heavy travel schedule. In 1991 he became Secretary General of the European Universities Continuing Education Network. Best known among his many publications was his 1977 book *From Quarks to Quasars*, an outline of modern physics. He was blessed with a huge enthusiasm for life and an unquenchable optimism. In Ted's eyes the glass was always at least three quarters full. He developed a passionate interest in the world of opera and was Chair of the Bristol branch of supporters of the Welsh National Opera.' His wife Erica died some years ago but he is survived by their daughter Katherine and son Gerard.

Lee Brian Turner (1957) died on 2 June 2022 aged 83. He was educated at Sherborne School in Dorset and came up to Keble to read History. Lee played tennis for the College (1958–60) and was Captain in 1960. He trained as a Ship Broker and became Chief Executive Officer of the Society of Maritime Arbitrators of San Francisco, USA (1985–2017). Lee joined the California Broking

Associates and rose to become President of the California Broking Associates (2002–2013). He married Virginia in 1973. Their son Charles emailed the College to say that ‘Lee died on 2 June at home with his family in California’.

Nabila Walji (2021)

died on 27 April 2022 aged 28. Her family wrote: ‘Nabila was born in Calgary, Alberta, Canada in 1993. She completed her early education in Edmonton and her undergraduate degree in Anthropology and International Development in McGill University in Montreal. Thereafter she spent almost four years in Nairobi, Kenya with different organisations including Aga Khan Foundation Canada (AKFC) and Engineers Without Borders (EWB). Nabila then studied at the Institute of Ismaili Studies in London where she completed her first Master’s degree in Islamic Studies and Humanities before pursuing a Master’s Degree in Visual Material and Museum Anthropology at Keble. Nabila left us with many gifts, her photography which gave us a lens through which we could see the world from her eyes and her writing including her most celebrated work *UnBelonging in my Fatherland* which told the story of her personality as the child of immigrants between her two homes—Canada and her Fatherland (East Africa). This led into her unfinished work about her Motherland (the Indian Subcontinent) which she was working on at Oxford at the time of her death. Nabila poured her passion into “Brush Your Cheek, Save a Life” an organisation which she co-founded that works towards addressing the lack of ethnic diversity in worldwide stem cell databases. Although we were shocked and heartbroken at her sudden demise, we feel her guiding us and giving us strength. While we grieve the loss of our incredibly passionate, inspiring and loving daughter, sister, granddaughter, cousin, niece, aunt and friend, we celebrate her life, her accomplishments, and the love she spread around the world through her contagious giggle, curiosity, friendliness and beautiful smile.’

Michael (Mike) Wallace (2003)

died on 19 November 2021 aged 35. His wife Claire wrote: ‘Never Stop Exploring, the phrase emblazoned on his much loved shirt, probably best embodies the spirit of Mike. Described by those who knew him in childhood as a small boy with a personality that far exceeded his stature. With his enthusiastic nature and curly ginger hair he could always be counted on to give a showman performance at an open mic night, lend a hand on a building project and as Deputy Head Boy organise the Gleniffer School dance. Never abandoning his sense of adventure, at seventeen Mike made the decision to swap the windswept hills of Renfrewshire for the carefully curated lawn of Keble’s Liddon Quad and threw himself into college life. He helped out on the Sutton Trust scheme, manned the phones for fundraising and organised black-tie socials. In all his activities Mike demonstrated an unwavering dependability, loyalty and infectious sense of humour. As noted by a Keble contemporary, ‘it was impossible not to feel the energy Mike brought with him, he was gifted at bringing people together and making them feel at ease’. Megaphone in hand, he finally found a sport which suited his slim physique and bellowing Glaswegian accent, coxing the first VIII in second year and later becoming Captain of Coxes. Fortunately between the early morning rowing and the late night black-tie socials Mike still made time for his studies and would later refer to his graduation as “the greatest day of his life”. With a degree in Engineering Science and a passion for people and exploring new places Mike sailed into a career as a Management Consultant which he would describe as “making complex projects happen” and would take him around the world to Rio De Janeiro. On his return to London in 2012 Mike became engaged in the Association for Project Management (APM) and registering as the youngest Project Professional in 2015 and becoming a trustee for the professional body in 2019. Colleagues would refer to Mike as “a phenomenally gifted consultant with a real passion for challenging the status quo and making a difference to people’s lives”. Always caring for others, towards the end of his life Mike dedicated his time to raising money for The Brain Tumour Charity by organising events and volunteering at the annual Twilight Walk. His hope was to provide better support and treatment for sufferers like himself. Mike is a dearly missed husband, son, brother, uncle, best-man, friend, confidant, coach and colleague. A spirited personality with a passion for adventure, he will be in our hearts forever.’

John Kenneth Warburton CBE (1952)

died on 3 March 2022 aged 89. His daughter Moira James (Keble 1979) wrote: ‘Born in Burslem in his beloved North Staffordshire, he attended Newcastle High School. During National Service in the Royal Army Ordnance Corps (1950–52) he was a member of his battalion shooting team which had considerable success at Bisley and in Army-wide competitions. He came up to Keble to read Jurisprudence and met his lifelong friends John Clark, Cliff Driver and Desmond Watkins, while renewing his primary school friendship with Alan Douglas. After going down he joined the London Chamber of Commerce (1956–59). He moved to the Birmingham Chamber (1959) where, after being called to the Bar at Gray’s Inn (1977), he became a much loved and respected Chief Executive (1979–94). Having led numerous trade missions to Russia, Australia, the Congo and Thailand he was awarded a CBE for services to exports (1983). He was President, British Chambers of Commerce Executives (1979–81), a member of the Steering Committee of the International Bureau of Chambers of Commerce (1976–94) and Chair of the Advisory Council of the West Midlands Industrial Development Association (1983–86). He served on the Review Body on Doctors’ and Dentists’ Remuneration (1982–92), was a Director of the National Garden Festival in Stoke

on Trent (1983–87) and a Founder Director of Business in the Community (1982). He was a Director of National Exhibition Centre Ltd (1989–95) and served on the Council of the University of Birmingham (1982–99) becoming a Life Member of its Court. After retirement in 1994 he was a voluntary advisor for British Executive Service Overseas, a Governor of Newman College (1993–2002) and Executive Chair (1999–2002). He was a Member of the Lord Chancellor’s Birmingham Advisory Committee (1993–99) appointing local magistrates and a Mediator for the Centre for Dispute Resolution. He chaired the Birmingham Macmillan Nurses Appeal (1994–97) and was Deputy Chair of the Birmingham Children’s Hospital Appeal (1996–98). He learned to sail and walked the Staffordshire Way and canal towpaths between Birmingham and Stratford-upon-Avon. In 1960 he married Patricia Gordon who died in 2009. He is survived by his sister Beryl, his daughter Moira, son-in-law Julian and grandsons Christopher and Dominic.’

Graham Neal Ward (1958)

died on 1 May 2022 aged 82. His son Andrew (Keble 1984) wrote: ‘Schooled in Sheffield at Lydgate Lane Primary School and then King Edward VII School, Graham came up to Keble having won a state scholarship to study Modern Languages (German and French) with a side-line in Trad Jazz and banjo playing. Like many of his generation, his facility with languages and Oxford-honed analytical mind quickly led him into the then nascent world of computing. His career paralleled the rapid evolution of computing in UK industry. He was involved in early systems implementations at United Steel in Sheffield, the company he joined on graduation in 1962 initially on O&M work then as an analyst/programmer. He was then lured to the more advanced computing team of Rolls Royce in Derby in 1966. He and his colleagues formed a computer consultancy spin-off when Rolls Royce declared bankruptcy and he worked on a number of large-scale public sector computerization projects for clients including the Open University, East Midlands Gas Board and the Office of National Statistics. In 1978 he took a job with American computer giant Digital, initially in Reading and then for five years in France. He retired from Digital in 1999 but then with the Millennium Bug looming did two years as a contractor for ABN AMRO bank in the City before hanging up his professional keyboard for good. In retirement, Graham threw himself into a range of activities with his customary enthusiasm and organisation. He was Chair of Governors for the local primary school for many years, a keen USA student, an active Liberal Democrat volunteer and a committed Rotarian. Just before his death his fellow Rotarians in Poole voted him a Paul Harris Fellow in recognition of his contributions. A lifelong Sheffield Wednesday fan, he finished on a high—he was able to listen to their qualification for the Championship play-offs last season but died before they were knocked out. Graham got engaged to his childhood sweetheart Christine whilst still at Keble and they were happily married for forty years until her tragic death from cancer in 2002. Graham died in Poole, Dorset and his funeral was attended by a number of Keble alumni whose long-time friendship he much valued. He is survived and much missed by his two sons Andrew and Patrick.’

Charles Simon Warner (1959)

died on 5 January 2022 aged 83. He was born in Liverpool and educated at Repton. After completing his National Service he came up to Keble to read Law. Julian Baskcomb a neighbour and friend sent us the following details: ‘Charles was a good cricketer and left-handed opening bat; for Oxford University in 1962 he played seven First-Class games (14 innings, 365 runs an average of 26.07 with two fifties and a top score of 77 against Essex. He also took 2 catches). In May that year aged 23 Warner made 45 for the University against his native Lancashire in The Parks as he and the captain Duncan Worsley raised a first innings century opening stand. His later teaching career started at Ludgrove School, Wokingham, Berkshire, an independent preparatory boarding school for boys. He was a long-standing member of Liverpool Cricket Club at Aigburth and played for them for twenty years from 1957–1977 and was a keen supporter of both Lancashire County Cricket Club and Liverpool Football Club. He retired from teaching to live in France for twenty years where after a short illness he died in Loches, Indre-et-Loire. Charles is survived by his wife Pascale and his two UK-based sons Barnaby and Henry from his first marriage’

Anthony (Tony) James Wickett (1969)

died on 12 January 2022 aged 70. He was educated at St Edward’s School, Oxford and came up to Keble to read Physics and remained for a DPhil (1972–76). He was awarded a Science Research Council Research Fellowship in the Oxford University Department of Astrophysics (1978–80). Tony remained in that Department for a further two years as a Post-Doctoral Research Assistant before joining the UK Atomic Energy Authority’s Safety and Reliability Directorate (1980–82). The UKAEA then sent him on Attachment to the Sandia National Laboratories in Albuquerque, New Mexico, USA (1982–84). On his return to the UK he went to the UKAEA/AEA Technology PLC’s Winfrith Technology Centre in Dorset until he retired. In 2002 he was working as a Principal Safety Consultant to Serco. He died peacefully in the Dorset County Hospital and his funeral was held at Holy Rood Church in Wool where the family lived.

Gerrit Julius Arend Karl Winter (1956)

died on 27 January 2022 aged 86. Educated at the Max Planck Gymnasium in Göttingen, Germany he studied Law at Würzburg University before coming to Keble for one year for a MJur. He returned to Germany for a PhD in Law at the Ernst-August University of

Göttingen (1957–61). He was in practice before the Land High Court, where he worked closely with colleagues in charge of Celle (1961–65) then Senior Assistant to the Seminar for Insurance Studies, Hamburg University where he worked with the colleagues in charge of Business Administration and with the Mathematical Institute of the University. In the 1970s he worked on the improvement of insurance law especially to protect consumers and the possibility of harmonising the law within the European Common Market. In 1977 he was appointed Professor of Civil Law, Insurance Law and Comparative Law in the Law Faculty of Hamburg University. From 1978–2006 he was Director of the Institute of Insurance Science in the Hamburg University Law Faculty. He was active in AIDA (The International Insurance Law Association) and in the 1990s he was a member of the pollution and product liability working groups. From 1990–2010 he served as a Vice Chairman, later Chairman of the Working Party on State Supervision of Insurance, and as a member of the Presidential Council. He is author of several books and numerous articles on insurance law. He was on the selection committees for the Rhodes Scholarships for Oxford and the Hanseatic Scholarships for British students. From 1978 to 1995 he served as Chairman of the Oxford University Society's German Branch. His hobbies were portrait painting and English Gardens. He is survived by his wife Christiane, son Frederick (Keble 1991) and daughter Christine (Keble 1992).
