FROM THE WARDEN

I am writing this introduction to *The Record* as I near the end of my first full year as Warden. I am delighted to have the opportunity to thank the whole College community for making me and my family so welcome and supporting me through the significant transition from my former role as a hospital physician in London and loyal St John's College alumnus!

The main purpose of this introduction is to record the changes that have occurred in the Fellowship in the past academic year. We said goodbye to two Career Development Fellows. Dr Jennifer Soong, Robin Geffen CDF in English, is moving to a tenure-track position at the University of Colorado. Richard Bell, CMRS Career Development Fellow in Renaissance History, is taking up a teaching position at the University of Birmingham. We wish them both great success as they continue their academic careers.

We welcomed two new Governing Body Fellows. Dr Christopher Proctor, Tutorial Fellow in Engineering Science, joined from the University of Cambridge. Father Max Kramer, Chaplain and Welfare Fellow, joined from Canterbury Cathedral, where he was Precentor.

We also welcomed Dr Jingyi Yang, Research Fellow and Tutor in Engineering Science.

Professor Chris Gosden, Professor of European Archaeology, has stepped down from the Chair but stays as a Fellow by Special Election while he works on a European Research Council Synergy grant. Professor Edward Harcourt moves from his Tutorial Fellowship to a Fellowship by Special Election while he continues his work in the Faculty of Philosophy. Dr Foteini Dimirouli, formerly Career Development and Access Fellow, has been elected to Governing Body as Research Fellow in English and Access Fellow.

Five new Fellows by Special Election have been elected. Four are members of the Emmy Network, which was founded by a Keble alumnus and aims to support and direct a growing global network of exceptional research fellows. These are: Professor Joseph Almog (Philosophy); Professor Ivette Fuentes (Physics); Professor Hugh Woodin (Mathematics); and Dr Jussi Westergren (Mathematics and Computer Science). Professor Daniela Ferreira (Biomedical Sciences) has also been elected to a Fellowship by Special Election.

Five alumni have been elected as Honorary Fellows. Paul Johnson is Director of the Institute for Fiscal Studies. Yasumasa Nagamine is a former Japanese ambassador to the United Kingdom and now serves on the Supreme Court of Japan. Professor Malek Peiris is Professor of Virology at the University of Hong Kong; he was also awarded an Honorary Degree of the University at Encaenia 2023. Angela Saini is an award-winning science journalist and author. Kate Varah is currently Executive Director of the National Theatre.

Sadly, I need to report the death of Honorary Fellow Victoria de Breyne (1919–2023). Victoria, the widow of Honorary Fellow Andre de Breyne, was a generous benefactor and good friend of College. A full obituary will be available on the new obituaries section of the College website in the Spring of 2024.

Finally, my predecessor Sir Jonathan Phillips was recognised for his long and outstanding service to College by election to an Honorary Fellowship. Jonathan worked tirelessly for College over his 12 years in office and strengthened its reputation in so many ways. I owe him a tremendous debt of gratitude for the position of the College when I took over from him and for his generosity in helping me to prepare as best as possible for the role. It is an honour to serve as your Warden and I look forward to meeting as many of you as possible over the coming years.

THE COLLEGE YEAR

Senior Tutor

Dr Ali Rogers

Looking back at the pandemic years, it strikes me that one of the toughest challenges we faced was not being able to rely so much on routine. I imagine most organisations are sustained by doing more or less the same thing at the same time. The need for constant improvisation is, by definition, significantly more demanding and exhausting. But experimentation can also have its rewards. On reflection, 2022 –23 was characterised by our greater willingness, if not to abandon routine (or one might say, tradition), at least to be more open to alternatives.

The most obvious example of changing the way we do things was the Oxford colleges' decision in May to carry on conducting undergraduate admissions interviews online, despite no longer having to do so. Keble tutors carried out 860 online interviews in December 2022. Two years of virtual interviewing persuaded the vast majority of our Tutorial Fellows that this was the better option. Opinion across the University was admittedly more divided and there were many tutors who believed we should return to in-person interviews, at least for applicants from the UK. A poll of students found that many welcomed the opportunity to travel to Oxford and get more of a taste of what it was like. We will need to find a way to enable offer-holders to visit the College before arriving, preferably at a more pleasant time of year than cold and wet December.

Another of the routines we're changing is Warden's Collections, the ritual of attending a formal meeting once a year with the Warden, Senior Tutor and subject tutors for the purposes of reviewing academic progress via termly tutorial reports. Even before the pandemic we'd dispensed with the requirement to wear gowns in the equivalent graduate progress meetings. Warden's Collections are now also gown-free and take place around a small circular table rather than across the grand and imposing dining table in the Lodgings. The tone is more informal and encouraging instead of the often dry recitation of tutors' reports. Particularly for first year undergraduates in their first term, these meetings with the Warden are a sign that 'the College' takes an interest in them as individuals, rather than treating them en masse. Traditionalists may rue the passing of yet another Oxford tradition, but after one year the change seems to have been met with widespread approval.

Perhaps the most common subject of debate among tutors has, understandably, been AI and how it will or should impact both teaching and examining. Last year I reported on the innovations in examining and these have continued. For a few selected subjects, the University trialled invigilated online exams, with students writing answers in Chromebooks (rather than their own laptops). In other cases, examining has returned to pen-and-paper in large halls. There are also signs that some MSc courses are shifting away from timed written exams altogether. We can learn from this diversity of assessment forms, although this year these trials have been impacted by the UCU marking and assessment boycott. At the time of writing, virtually all Keble undergraduate finalists have been awarded a classified degree (PPE is an exception), although a small number have paper marks missing. For the record, 95% have a First or 2.1. There were notable successes this year for English and joint schools (7 Firsts out of 10), Engineering (7 Firsts out of 11), and Geography (6 Firsts out of 11).

Academic Director of The H B Allen Centre

Dr Ian W Archer

As Academic Director, I have continued to work in association with a particularly dynamic MCR Committee to develop a programme of events designed to bring the graduates together as an academic community. We have continued the research showcases where students present their work in a series of five minute talks, and revived the discussion evenings in the Warden's Lodgings. A pleasing feature of this year has been the initiative of the MCR in generating its own programme: the Cheese and Why events pioneered by Chrisen Gomez generated really high powered interdisciplinary discussion. We ran a lively panel discussion around the launch of a series of videos on handmade creativity led by the cognitive archaeologist Emanuele Prezioso which touched on key themes of cultural identity, mental health, and sustainability. Graduates in the business school put together an interesting evening discussing careers in management consultancy. Quite a lot of what we do is straightforward sociability: graduates dine weekly on high table in term time, and we put on regular mixer events. But out of the peculiar sociability of College life intellectual connections are forged.

JCR President

This academic year was set to be the one where we went 'back to normal' but with a cost of living crisis making things tighter than ever before, the year was far from easy. Despite this, the JCR community, spearheaded by the seriously hard-working JCR committee, has been a picture of community, fun, and resilience, and I feel very proud to look back on the year we've had.

We started the year off in Michaelmas with some big changes to College staff—a new Chaplain, new Domestic Bursar, new Warden, and most importantly... new dog (the JCR loves Rievaulx!). All have made a great effort to get to know the JCR at events and around College, and this sense of community and togetherness has shone through in other places too... Liddon quad opened up in Trinity for everyone to use, the bar increased its offering from three to six days per week, and the first ever Keble Garden Play (written and directed by JCR members) was held at HBAC.

This year the JCR have had some big wins. Keble topped the chart for the third year running in the 'Great Oxbridge BOGOF' (a charity competition where students 'buy one, give one free' to local food banks). We've donated to some amazing local and national charities including It Happens Here Oxford, Alzheimer's Society, and Tingewick. We held a 'Pink Week' formal dinner raising money for breast cancer charities, hosted hundreds of students from ethnic minority backgrounds for dinner and drinks, and were proud hosts to 'Tuesdays' in collaboration with the LGBTQ+ society.

Further highlights include... Hertble (the Keble/Hertford Women's FC) and KCFC reaching the semi-final of both Cuppers tournaments, KCBC's M1 winning blades in Torpids and W2 winning blades in both Torpids and Summer Vills, the hugely successful Keble Arts Festival themed 'Carnival', and this year's Freshers President, Cait Gillett, organising an amazing induction week for our newest cohort.

That said, the year hasn't all been plain sailing. In Hilary, Governing Body took the decision that Keble Ball 2023 was not financially feasible, causing great disappointment, particularly for those students who are yet to experience a Keble Ball due to the COVID 19 pandemic. Further, the same economic pressures led to significant rent and food price increases. Yet, throughout it all, the JCR has kept its chin up, looked outside the box for resolution, and remained united.

Every Sunday evening the JCR holds a meeting where it passes motions, conducts 'hustings' for election candidates, hears reports from the JCR officers, and most importantly, enjoys some snacks. The motions can be playful (this year we welcomed a new JCR chess board, and commissioned our own painting of Keble), but they can also be serious. In Trinity, we discussed the difficult but important question of whether, and if so how, we should respond to the Oxford Union's invitation to Kathleen Stock. We made sure to give the debate the time and attention it deserved, producing a thoughtful and measured statement (find it on our Instagram!) that I'm very proud of and represents how respectful the JCR community is.

In Trinity it was also amazing to see so many freshers running for election to be on the JCR Committee next year. With Samuel Pugh at its helm, I'm sure that the Committee and the JCR is in safe hands. It's been an honour to serve as President this year and I can't wait to see what the next Committee achieves!

MCR President *Kevin Wang*

22/23 marked the first "non-COVID" year, an opportunity to revitalise the MCR community from its pandemic slumber. The introductions of a new Warden, Domestic Bursar, Chaplain and other staff in new roles brought challenges within the high inflation year of 2022 and 2023, but also a chance to start anew with re-building a post-COVID Keble College and MCR.

Michaelmas term started strong with a landmark fresher's month organized by Max Anderson Loake with help from the Committee and Talbot Fund that provided financial support for multiple events to welcome the new and returnee members of the eclectic MCR community. 2022–2023 saw the full swing of many events led by our two social secretaries Jeanne Inchauspé and Chrishen Gomez who pioneered new academic formats such as Cheese and Why where Keble students talked about their research to peers every fortnight. The year was also dotted with BOPs (with themes such as Party Like the Ancients, Heroes vs Villains), Pride Sunset Terrace, Port Meadow Picnic and many more. Edward Shellard and Kat Bochtler organised multiple black-tie dinners and exchange dinners, that in conjunction with themed formal nights (such as Diwali, Eid and Burns Night) again brought Keble and its MCR to one of the centres of social life in the University. Old traditions were also continued with consistent welfare brunches hosted by the welfare team and also MCR tables on a Friday formal hall where wine and non-alcoholic refreshments were provided. New innovations were also made, such as with Ellie Falkingham's reforming of the High Table ballot and David Hochhauser's new approach with art events with life drawing, pottery and printing-making sessions throughout the whole year. Our wine steward Halley Rose Meslin hosted multiple wine tastings while Udai Dhamija both organised the annual Selwyn Exchange and consolidated many sports societies for the MCR.

With a fully packed social calendar, our Committee focused on bringing back old formats (such as graduate discussion in Warden lodgings and with Ian Archer at large), but also further making our events inclusive by trying to focus some on weekends and evenings to better integrate the PGCE and EMBA's and Part-time students. Furthermore, specific attention was given to cohorts affected by COVID. By revitalizing the COVID Surplus fund set up by the MCR in 2020 under Annie Welden, in 2022–23 we strived to provide morning brunches on the days after graduations for graduands affected by COVID in the years of 2019–2021.

This year also served as a great chance to catch up on long overdue maintenance and renovation issues within the MCR. However, with great support and help from the Domestic Bursar, Jodi Thomas and the entire maintenance team the MCR saw many revitalisations at all scales. In terms of large projects, the MCR saw a room overhaul on the Parks Site with the updating of MCR Photos (filling in gaps and creating/hanging up COVID photos), getting a new TV and sound systems, a new microwave and the eventual mounting of rowing blades both old and new from 2023. Small renovations that made big differences included replacing broken wheels on washing machines and making the MCR accessibility door useable by all. Most importantly the refurbishing and buying of coffee machines and active negotiated coffee bean subscriptions locally sourced by Natalia Hong have refuelled the MCR at Large. The year also saw the donation of two art pieces to the MCR that can be seen in both MCRs by Jack Blake and David Hochhauser.

This year we also revitalised the College bar, where Ellie and I developed a new staffing structure with MCR graduate bar staff and increased bar opening from three days a week to six days. This on top of other College policies we strived for with the College, such as child-friendly hours and routes for mature students, increased bookable rooms and 24-hour gyms—to which this year we finally got HBAC gym mirrors after four consecutive years of attempting!

Representation was also a key aspect of this year's MCR development as Sierra Sparks, Ajantha Abey and Eleanor Warrington spearheaded the creation of the MCR EDI Subcommittee and Tino Lukas for sustainability within the College and the introduction of hedgehog hotels. Our year also saw the important but also required long journey of Constitutional and Standing order revisions and amendments and continued operation of meetings overseen by Ellie and Youri.

Behind the scenes in the Committee, there were also big changes in practice and governance. This year saw a major innovation in data management and new archiving of MCR documents in a consolidated MCR Teams account, which also saw the shutdown and centralisation of largely all previous MCR accounts. On the finance side, account efficiency and transparency became key and the MCR Treasurer pursued and succeeded in cancelling unused subscriptions from decades past. In general, governance at the MCR level internally became one via Excel.

Looking back and even during the moment, there is no doubt that none of this would be possible without the hard and relentless work provided by the MCR Committee and the consistent engagement provided by the community—furthered by the invaluable advice and tips from previous presidents. I am happy to look forward to the year ahead as I have no doubt the common room will be in steady hands under the leadership and guidance of our new President, Laura Haas, and her Committee. We all look forward to the direction and successes they will achieve!

Bursar

We knew that there would be no easing of financial headwinds as we entered 2022/23 and the budget reflected this, showing a small total College annual cashflow deficit. The actual outturn was an operationally successful year with cashflow slightly better than budget due to receipt of an unexpected large unrestricted legacy and deferral of certain capital expenditure.

Student occupancy was again high this year, as we continued to accommodate some of the 'COVID bulge' in undergraduate numbers in The H B Allen Graduate Centre. From a non-academic perspective, the student College experience is now fully back to normal, post pandemic, with high numbers of students dining in Hall and participating in the full range of College sports and social activities.

The conference business continued to recover strongly post-pandemic, posting record revenue, at least in nominal terms, of £3.3m compared to the previous peak of £2.7m in 2017. Unfortunately, the profit contribution from this revenue was slightly lower than in 2017 due to the impact of inflation on the cost base, but conference profitability was higher than had been budgeted for the year.

The financial headwinds that we faced were almost all inflation related and included two exceptional cost of living payments for Keble staff, higher insurance premium costs, higher

recruitment and agency costs, exceptionally high food cost inflation and above-budget general cost inflation.

The overall result was that annual College cashflow was slightly positive, but if the capital expenditure phasing benefit and unexpected legacy are excluded, the underlying result was a larger deficit than had been budgeted.

Looking forward, a key challenge is that from January 2024 we must begin repaying the £4m of short-term bank debt taken on to cover exceptional COVID costs. We expect a total cashflow budget deficit for the second year running in 2023/24, including these debt repayments. Before debt repayments budgeted College cashflow is slightly positive, reflecting some degree of progress towards our £2m annual cashflow improvement target.

However, it is fair to say that the College is straining to hold this close to break-even position now that the impact of very high inflation is baked into the cost base. We are assuming that the conference business can increase profitability on a similar revenue base to last year. The business is mostly constrained to vacations and activity levels over these weeks are now at all-time highs. Growth in academic fees is not within College control and have increased at a rate considerably lower than inflation for many years now. We have however reluctantly been forced to pass on large inflationary cost increases to students of 23% for rent and 26% for food over the last 2 years. Governing Body is acutely aware of the resulting adverse impact on student finances, the student experience and on our Access agenda.

Against this challenging backdrop, the one reliable source of relief is generous philanthropic support, particularly in the form of unrestricted gifts or endowments, for which we are extremely grateful.

Chaplain

It has been a wonderful first year at Keble! It's hard to believe that only twelve months ago I left Canterbury Cathedral to come back to Oxford, and I have been very grateful for the welcome and support of all at Keble in my new role.

Life in the Chapel continues to thrive, with wonderful music-making from our truly outstanding Choir and Organ Scholars, who have been led this year by the inspirational harpsichordist and choral director Chris Bucknall. Duruflé's *Requiem* for All Souls' Day, a magical Advent Carol Service, the richness of the Keble Early Music Festival, and an impressive BBC Radio 3 Choral Evensong right at the start of Trinity Term were all highlights, as were several new pieces written for Keble by our two Visiting Fellows, the composers Deborah Pritchard and Cheryl Frances-Hoad.

Our Sunday Sermons this year have included contributions from Bishop Humphrey Southern, Nick Papadopoulos, Dean of Salisbury, and The Revd Professor William Whyte, whose St Mark's Day sermon drew out connections between the architecture of our Chapel, the Oxford Movement, and the mission of a College in the modern day. One particularly significant moment in the year was our annual Holocaust Memorial Day Service, sung jointly by the local Jewish Choir OxfordShir and our College Choir. Our preacher, Rabbi David Mitchell (West London Synagogue) reflected on the need to stand up to oppression and falsehood, and reflected on his own work as a student in opposing the Holocaust-denier David Irving.

Outside Chapel we have developed a number of new initiatives. Max's Lunch on a Monday aims to bring together interesting people to speak about interesting things over a sandwich lunch. It is an opportunity to think far beyond our own disciplines. Our talks have ranged this year from using origami to design solar arrays for satellites, to how to prepare for the next pandemic, to Michaelangelo's poetry, art censorship in early-modern Italy, the architecture of The H B Allen Centre, diversity in the boardroom, and much, much more. Alongside this, opportunities for socialising, learning, and friendship have been developed through Doughnut Tuesday (self-explanatory!), port & hot chocolate after Thursday Compline, weekly Chapel Tours, and a whole range of special events.

Our work with our 69 Keble Parishes continues. On my very first day I made the journey to present the new vicar of Holy Trinity Brompton (HTB) London, one of the Church of England's largest Churches, and one of Keble's most recently-acquired patronages. Since then Fr Darren and I between us have sought to support several parishes as they seek new clergy. In January Fr Gerwyn Capon took up his role in the Benefice of Thaxted (Chelmsford), and Fr Jonathan MacNeaney began his ministry at St Mary's Balham (Southwark). A number of other appointment processes are underway, along with a several reorganisations, and we hope to have a number of new clergy in post in time for the next edition of *The Record*! This year we re-started our Corporate Communion Service to which all our Parishes are invited, and are hoping to start our Clergy Conference and Parish Days once again in the near future.

2023 marks the 150th anniversary of the beginning of the building of Keble Chapel, which was completed three years later. We will be working towards this major anniversary in several exciting ways—watch this space! It is a delight to begin this special time by welcoming two new colleagues to join us in September. Christian Wilson will be our new Director of Music, following a number of years at Brasenose College, and Lizzy Flaherty will join us in a new role as Chapel Intern as she divides her time between Keble and St Andrew's Headington as part of her preparation for ordination.

This year, Keble College Chapel Choir was conducted by Christopher Bucknall, and enjoyed a fresh spin on the choral services alongside the new Chaplain, Fr Max Kramer. These included two unique lower-voice or upper-voice only Complines, services and performances accompanied by Instruments of Time and Truth, and world premiere performances of no fewer than three works of music!

The year began with a particularly high turnover of chorists and staff (namely, Director of Music, Chaplain and Warden), which enabled Chris to work with a relatively blank slate, and produce some incredible music by the time the Advent Carol Services came around. These included the world premiere of *The Light of the World* by Deborah Pritchard, a particularly unique piece for choir and solo violin. Through Trinity term, there were a number of musical delights on top of the usual services, including the Keble Responses and a new Grace, 'Benedictus Benedicat', by Cheryl Francis-Hoad, and a once-in-a-lifetime trip to Finland to sing for an alumnus and donor, and to perform a concert in Turku Cathedral, a truly historic cathedral nearing eight hundred years of age. Though we will be sad to see Christopher Bucknall move on at the end of this year, we look forward to Christian Wilson taking over, and seeing what he has to offer in the coming years!

With some members of the choir finishing their degrees only a few hours before starting their travels, this action-packed tour presented an apt way of celebrating the intensity of the academic year.

As the bulk of our choir arrived on Friday evening, marking the end of the year over a drink watching the Finnish sunset, a small group left Oxford for their overnight stay at Heathrow before their swift travel the next day. Saturday saw the choir sing at a Keble alumnus' wedding, where we were welcomed with generous hospitality—some choir members even managed to impress guests with their ballroom dancing.

Following a chance to soak in Turku town, a productive afternoon of detailed rehearsal preceded a concert at Turku Cathedral put on by our choir. The building's rich history dating back to the thirteenth century (and involving rebuilding from the Great Fire of Turku) provided a sonically and historically full-bodied backdrop for our choir, with our two organ scholars being treated by the organ's impressive horizontal 'en chamade' trumpet stops. The choir showed flair in their celebration of British choral works, ranging from sixteenth-century polyphony in William Byrd's 'Vigilate' to a contemporary setting of George Herbert's poem 'The Call' by Gail Randall.

A final evening in Turku town gave the choir a chance to unwind after a chorally intensive weekend, giving our leavers and director Chris a jolly send-off as our time together comes to a close.

Librarian

It has been another busy year in the Library. The reading rooms and collections continue to be well used during term, but even in the vacations when things look quiet, there is a lot of activity behind the scenes. In addition to our rolling programme of updating all subject areas, we have continued our work to support the whole of student life at Keble by expanding the non-academic collections. These include sections of fiction, study skills and careers guides, and most recently the series of Very Short Introductions, in which experts explain subjects from Abolitionism to Zola in no more than 150 pages.

As a part of the network of libraries across Oxford, Keble Library also meets the needs of today's students by helping them make good use of the enormous number of ebooks, online journals, and other digital resources that the University provides. We answer queries about how to use them, and also bought more ebooks than ever, so the library is supporting those students who might never physically enter the library once Freshers' week is over, as well as those we see every day.

The College Librarian, Fiona Wilson, returned from maternity leave in January, and Acting Librarian Leona Stewart was promoted to Deputy Librarian. Assistant Librarian Dominic Hewett left us for an exciting role as Research Support Librarian at the Imperial War Museum.

In Michaelmas, the library hosted its first 'Meet the Manuscripts' event. This gave students, fellows, and staff the opportunity to see some of the highlights of Keble's special collections, including a book of French Christmas Carols from around the year 1600, and the ninth century manuscript fragments that are the oldest items in the library. The second event in Hilary featured our first edition of Milton's *Paradise Lost* and book of vivid Japanese images among other items; alumni were able to join us virtually via a video feature in *The Brick*.

Another highlight was supporting a seminar for our students of Italian by showing them books produced in the same medieval courtly circles they were learning about, alongside some of the earliest editions of Dante's works in print. As well as supporting teaching, we learned more ourselves when one of our fourteenth century manuscripts, a New Testament, was virtually reunited with its long-lost Old Testament companion volume. The latter was dismembered and dispersed long ago, but fragments in the British Library and the Victoria and Albert Museum have been digitised and provide new evidence about the origins of our own volume, demonstrating that it was produced in the Netherlands for the crusading Order of Teutonic Knights.

The role of a college library is generally to provide breadth—that is, lending copies of key undergraduate texts across all subjects—while the Bodleian and faculty libraries provide the depth. There are a couple of areas, however, where Keble Library aims for more comprehensive coverage, including the Oxford Movement, and books by and about people associated with the College. In June we spent some time improving our coverage of books about Charlotte M Yonge. Known as 'The novelist of the Oxford Movement', she was a neighbour and friend of John Keble as well as a bestselling writer, and donated signed copies of her works to the fledgling college library. We also filled in some historic gaps in our Keble Authors section. This collection is one way of capturing a snapshot of the variety of things that Keble students go on to do; we are always glad to receive additions, and thank those who have donated their own works in the last year who are including amongst the names below.

Archivist

It is probably fair to say that the stereotype of archivists is that they are obsessed with the past. Contrary to that stereotype, the majority of my work this year has been planning for the future.

Libraries and archives always have to be prepared for the worst, with fires and floods in such buildings often being reported in the news. With that in mind, I worked with the Librarians to create a Disaster Plan, setting out our priorities and strategies for major or minor disasters affecting our collections.

Technical support for the cataloguing software I use for both archives and records management is being removed at the end of this calendar year. This prompted the acquisition of Epexio, a web-based alternative. This is the first step towards making our archives catalogue available online. Some work will be required before a publicly accessible online catalogue is possible but this will be my priority moving forwards. A phased approach to publishing the catalogue is likely.

Another aspect of planning for the future is preservation. Having recently acquired DigiSafe, a University of Oxford service which offers a secure system for long-term preservation of digital objects, I have uploaded all of our digital archives. The next step will be to start working with College departments to use the system for semi-current records, as part of our records management programme.

With new capacity for storing digital records, I have seized this opportunity to digitise all of the catalogued audio/visual recordings in the archives. A catalyst for this project was that an academic asked to listen to an audio cassette and I realised that access would be greatly improved if the recording were digitised. Digitisation can require significant resources so this project shows the value of strategic digitisation, as a solution to the possible degradation of the original items and the challenges of providing access.

Among the new accessions added to the archives this year were two Ordnance Survey maps, dated 1874, and formerly held by the Oxford City Council, City Engineer Department. These prompted me to research a few of the College's architectural mysteries. The results can be found in a History Feature on the College's heritage microsite, entitled '[Forgotten Passages and Doorways](#)'.

This year's visitors to the archives included members of Butterfield family, who donated a copy of their family tree to the archives, to further researchers' understanding of Keble College's first architect. Relatives of David Talboys, the College's longest serving member of staff (68 years: 1875–1943), also visited and donated copies of their family history research. College archives seldom hold as much information on staff as they do on students and Fellows, despite the obvious impact staff have on the College and how fondly they may be remembered by alumni. With that in mind, these papers greatly improve our understanding of the College.

2023 marked the 150th Anniversary of KCCC and as a result we were keen to make it an unforgettable season. It got off to a special start with the President of the MCC, Stephen Fry, wishing us well in the form of a letter, congratulating us on our milestone (the only milestone we would be reaching this season).

Rowing (Women)

The 2022/23 year was a fantastic year for KCBC. We made it a priority to recruit new athletes to our novice and senior squads, through a variety of rowing taster sessions in all three academic terms, barbecues, and other social events.

We had many coaches who were instrumental in the continued success of the club this year: our head coaches Michael, Julia, and Tim, and assistant coaches Iz, Katherine, Josh, and Sophie. They all brought with them a wealth of experience and managed to make a cohesive training plan for all our women's crews, which consisted of weekly water sessions, ergs, and strength and conditioning sessions.

In Michaelmas, we entered one novice women's crew into the Nephthys Regatta, and one women's crew into the Michaelmas Novice Regatta, and both crews had a strong performance after just mere weeks of rowing. Our senior women ended up winning the women's category at the Nephthys Regatta, which contributed to Keble's exciting overall win of that regatta.

In Hilary, we picked up our training and had our sights set on a successful Torpids campaign. To get more experience with racing, we competed in the Henley Fours and Eights Head, with our W1 crew racing in a coxed four, and our W2 racing in a coxed eight. The W2 had an extremely strong race, and the W1 placed second in their division. With our novice and senior squads now training together, we had a squad with a depth of talent that allowed us to enter three women's crews into Torpids—the most women's crews that Keble has ever entered. Our W2 was the fastest crew in rowing on qualifiers, and our W3 was the next fastest crew—an incredible feat! Rugby (Men)
